2. Southeast Cluster Spiritual Renewal: Oct. 8-11

The Southeast Iowa Cluster is having our Spiritual Renewal Circuit Ride Oct 8 -11 with Sister Dawn Ottoni-Wilhelm. Using texts from the four Gospels, speaker Dawn Ottoni-Wilhelm will explore the theme, “Jesus’ Ways to Newness of Life,” during the annual Southeast Iowa Spiritual Renewal Circuit Ride. The event is held this year October 8-11 at four locations across southeastern Iowa.

Sunday evening, October 8, we will see from the Gospel of Luke how Jesus provides a new mind. Monday’s message will focus on the Gospel of Mark and how Jesus renews lives. We will see in the Gospel of Matthew how Jesus meets the physical needs of our bodies. The event concludes Wednesday by seeing how the Gospel of John reveals Jesus gives new and fearless spirits.



Southern Iowa “Spiritual Renewal Circuit Ride” will begin this year at the Ottumwa Church of the Brethren with a workshop Sunday afternoon at 3:30. The congregation will provide supper at 6:00. Worship and preaching will follow at 7:00 p.m. Monday’s meeting at the Prairie City Church of the Brethren (south of Prairie City and west of Monroe) will have the same schedule. Tuesday’s 6:00 supper and following worship will be at the English River Church of the Brethren east of South English. A 6:00 supper and 7:00 worship at the Fairview Church of the Brethren south of Unionville will conclude this year’s Circuit Ride on Wednesday.

There are two opportunities to earn CEU’s during this event. Sunday afternoon (at 3:30) Sister Dawn will lead a workshop on “Living Words of Scripture in Worship” at the Ottumwa CoB. What: A special fall two-day retreat for women of all ages! (attend one or both days)

Where: Camp Pine Lake, Eldora, Iowa (sponsored by the Nurture & Witness

Commissions of the Northern Plains District of the Church of the Brethren)

When: Friday October 20 (Arrive any time after 1:00p with the first meal at 6:30p)

thru Saturday October 21 (Closing devotions at 3:00 so people can leave if they need to. Others may work longer and share a light meal later in the afternoon.)

Feeding our spirits: devotions, journaling, hiking, private Bible study, discussion

Group activities: cutting, sewing, tying, knitting, crocheting to make comforters for Church World Service 60x80 (sent to refugees and disaster areas) and smaller blankets 36x36 and 45x60 (for Hardin County Police to give to children as needed)

What to bring with you: Bible, bedding, towel, toiletries, flashlight, a snack to share. Four buildings at the camp can be heated so we can be comfortable in the cool evenings.

For the comforter and blanket making: donations of any of the following would be welcome; clean gently used bed pads, sheets, flannel blankets, scraps of cotton fabric suitable for quilting, 4ply yarn.

Equipment you might bring: sewing machine, rotary cutter and mat, knitting needles and crochet hooks to fit 4 ply yarn.

Cost: suggested donation of \$17 for overnight camp stay and \$5 per meal, payable upon arrival.

7. Healthy and Safe Congregations Training, November 10-11, 2017 at Camp Pine Lake

The safety of children and youth is the responsibility of every adult. The district board has created a Task Force on Child Sexual Abuse Prevention to help congregations develop the policies, practices and awareness to recognize potential problems and prevent harm.

We are pleased to announce a special training in this sacred work of creating **Healthy and Safe Congregations**. Kathy Reid, our facilitator, brings decades of work in the area of child protection. She has authored several books about the prevention of child sexual abuse for congregations. Kathy is ordained in the Church of the Brethren and served on the national staff as the Associate General Secretary. She is personable, caring, and excellent as a trainer.

The training will be held on **November 10-11 at Camp Pine Lake**. We will begin with a light dinner on Friday evening and close by 4:30 on Saturday. The District Board has very generously made funds available for the training, so we anticipate that there will be little or no cost to participants.

This is a unique opportunity to increase your understanding about child sexual abuse, recognize potential red flags, learn helpful responses if you suspect something, and become familiar with policies and practices that can help prevent a tragedy.

Pastors, youth advisors, Christian Education workers, camp counselors, board members, and anyone concerned with the well-being of children and their congregation, are encouraged to attend. The goal is to have at least one person from each congregation represented. CEU's are available.

PRESS ON.

As we look forward to 2018 District Conference, what vision and goals will we set for our time between now and then? Perhaps some are personal—like a young neighbor who resolved to lose weight and to seek help in doing just that. Now she's 100 pounds lighter, and I celebrate that achievement with her! However, her response is that she is not done yet. **She presses on** with diet and exercise, because she has even a higher goal.

In 2016 our local church challenged each of us in the congregation to read the entire Bible in 2017—an ambitious goal of reading 4 pages a day beginning with Genesis. The reading has prompted new interest in the Old Testament as pastors have built sermons on the current reading for each week. We've now completed the reading of the Old Testament and look forward to more inspiration as we read the Gospels.

Goals involve dedication and commitment for every day of the year. One of the best examples of striving to meet his goal was the Apostle Paul. As he sat in prison, chained to a Roman guard, he considered all his prior accomplishments as nothing compared to his main goal for life.

Not that I have already obtained this or have reached my goal; but I press on to make it my own because Christ Jesus had made me his own. Philippians 3.12



PRESS ON! Amazingly although composed in prison chained to a guard, Philippians is Paul's most upbeat letter to churches. Paul believed that he had much more work ahead to reach his goal—***to know Christ and the power of his resurrection...and to attain his own resurrection from the dead.*** Phil. 3.10,11

SESSION LXI: ON COLLECTIONS

What do you collect? Why?

I collect Midwest art, mostly original watercolor paintings of Iowa fields, fences, barns, and windmills. Decorating my home with them is my way of preserving the Forties and Fifties way of life. Setting the mood in my living room are prints of a red one room schoolhouse and a little white church as well as a tapestry of a country home. My small town/rural theme happens to extend out my windows. My bedroom overlooks a field and forest. My office window features the road out of town. The living room view is of a parklike setting with three large trees and a quiet subdivision. My daily surroundings are all of one piece. To describe some of my artworks:

- Two paintings by Ankeny, IA artist Pat Hykes depict gas stations from my past. They were done from photographs. One is of the Handsaker gas station on Highway 65 between Colo and Zearing. I'm glad for the visual reminder of the landmark place where we filled up on our way to visit my paternal grandparents down the road Geneva. Only an overgrown stone marker and an abandoned farmhouse are currently on the site. Another painting is of a long-gone gas station/grocery store in Panora. A family friend, Naomi Beal, lived above the store growing up.
- A panoramic watercolor depicts the rolling Iowa countryside in spring. The rows of corn are just visible in spring, magnifying the contours of the land. It is a study in greens.
- A Midwest storm is brewing in black and deep blues and purples in another watercolor.
- My favorite is called "Wash Day in May." Clothes blowing on the line stretch from a farmhouse to a barn. In the foreground in a lush garden.

Rounding out my décor and colorful calendars and sayings that give me pause, like the plaque over the stove that reads: Gardens and families must be tended daily. My home helps me remember a time when people talked to each other face to face, families gathered for reunions, and churches were the social centers of the community. I can't turn back time, but my collection reminds me to extend the spirit of civility that was the overlay of a vanishing way of life.

11. Leadership Development Musings

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Barbara & I attended the National Older Adult Conference (NOAC) the first week of September and each morning, Stephen Breck Reid led us in Bible Study. We studied Moses, Ruth, and Esther and how each of them were mentors (a coach, guide, tutor, counselor, trusted advisor) as well as mentees (protégé, a person who is trained, advised, counseled).

Moses is mentored from the margins in Exodus chapters 2 by the Egyptian and Hebrew women and also in chapter 18 by his Midianite father-in-law. Then in chapter 3 Moses has a religious experience that changed his life, that being the burning bush where he is commissioned to the role of leading the Israelites out of Egypt. Moses in turn mentors Joshua in Exodus chapter 17 in the battle against the Amalekites.

Ruth is a story about being mentored during dangerous transitions, i.e. mother-in-law Naomi losing her husband and 2 sons, one of which was Ruth's husband; the famine in the land and then having to travel back to Naomi's home country. Naomi was a mentor to Ruth and Ruth in turn was a mentor to her people following her meeting with Boaz and working in the fields. Ruth told Naomi-your people will be my people and your God will be my God.

Esther is an intriguing book of the Bible as this is the first male-female mentoring! Esther is mentored by her cousin Mordecai, who adopted her as his own daughter after her parents died. Esther is made queen and was given a call or commission to advocate for her people and she did so by taking her place of privilege to leverage it for her people with the mentoring, counseling, and advice of her cousin Mordecai.
