

Mending Resources

Tools + materials

Below is a list of items you'll need for our in person or virtual class.

We have <u>mending kits</u> available for purchase. <u>Check out our currently available mending supplies here.</u>

I encourage you to support your local fabric/craft store if you can. In Chicago, we have <u>The WasteShed</u>, <u>Textile Discount Outlet</u>, and <u>Maydel</u>. Some of these links may be affiliate links which means I'll receive a small commission at no cost to you.

Required/ highly recommended:

(not included in basic mending kits:)

• Embroidery scissors/<u>thread snips</u>

(Included in kits):

- Tapestry needles
 - These types of needles have a dull point and large eye
 - I usually use size 18-22 with medium weight yarns
- A swatch of knit fabric to practice stitching or a garment you don't mind practicing on, about 4" x 4".
 - A knitted sweater or socks also work well.
- Mending/darning varn
 - o Or wool mending yarn
 - Match the yarn to the fiber you're mending. For example, use wool or a wool blend for a wool sweater; cotton embroidery thread for a cotton sweater, etc.
- All-purpose thread but also see below*
 - o Gutermann is a nice brand
- Hand sewing needles
 - Longer needles, sometimes called darning needles, are helpful, but if you can't find them or want to use what you already own regular hand sewing needles are fine
- Straight pins (in kits)
 - or safety pins (not in kits, but not needed if you have straight pins)
- A swatch of fabric to practice stitching or a garment you don't mind practicing on, about 6" x 6".
 - Denim/jeans and/or a button down shirt work well.



Optional (included in kit):

- Sashiko or embroidery thread
 - *Embroidery thread can be subbed for all-purpose thread if you so choose
- Fabric scraps for patching to match the fabric you're patching
 - o For example: cotton swatches if you're repairing a cotton shirt

Optional (not included in kit):

- Darning egg: can be used for mending socks
- <u>Darning mushroom</u>: can be used for mending socks, sweaters, or knit garments
- Other objects around the house I've used instead of a darning egg/mushroom:
 - o Ladle, tennis ball, glass jar

Nice to have:

- Large fabric scissors for cutting fabric
- Needle threader (included in kits)
- A small ruler or measuring tape
