EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS INFO:

Three Major Threats

First, *the three major threats* in Maricopa County (according to my homeward Emergency Preparedness presentation) are:

- Sex offenders in your area
 - Know where they are and who for your own safety.
- Chemical Plant leaks, Nuclear Plant explosions OR City-wide Electrical Outages:
 - Palo Verde Nuclear Plant Generating Station in Tonopah, AZ (about 1.5 hrs away)
 - https://ready.maricopa.gov/1002/PVGS
 - Radiation released into the air, which means it'll travel quickly: traffic & panic
 - Chemical leaks take weeks to clean up. If they are near your home, immediate evacuation might be required.
 - If at any time your health begins to change, you may have been exposed already.
 What do you do? Just leave.
 - Timelines of recovery to air exposure 15-30 mins
 - Exposure radius with the factor of dry air. *50 miles away.
 - Remember when electricity goes out, any electrical alarms to Emergency Services will cut out to. Emergency Services include but not limited to: Fire Stations, Police Stations, Ambulances, Security Systems.
 - Also, oftentimes stores, banks, and restaurants will immediately close because all their systems will be down. This is a reminder to buy the food now that you need to get through an unusual circumstance like your local stores closing for a few days.
 - Recovery time: 3-4 days
- Civil unrest
 - If you are within 10 miles there is no need to evacuate
 - o If you are within 5 miles, be ready with your essentials. Just in case.
 - o If you are within 1 mile, get out now. Or buckle down.
 - Remember that civil unrest is more of a mindset. So, if you or your property are in "their way," you will no longer be seen as a fellow human being, but a part of the problem.

Car kit

Get Home Bags:

Its purpose is to get me back home wherever you are. It could include local maps, extra cash for travel or food, travel shoes, a jacket or sweater, change of clothes and undies, etc.

Emergency evacuation kit: personalized

Second, the link for the google sheet: <u>96 Hr. Kit</u>. This document is sharable and the link is open to the public. I store mine in two seperate backpacks, but some people use totes. You can also store some of your supplies in your car.

Third, Emergency Foods:

There are three categories of Emergency food I would suggest buying from:

- 1. LDS Food Storage
- 2. Instant "Add-hot-water" Emergency food packets
- 3. Extra pantry canned, or bottle foods
- 1. This is where you can order LDS Food Storage online: <u>Provident Life</u>. They also have <u>Drinking Water Guidelines</u>. And here is the Provident Living <u>Food Calculator</u>. It measures by weeks, so if you want to start small, like 3 months, enter 12 weeks and see what pops up below.

Some Food Storage is not available because of high demand, but things like rice and beans keep pretty well in dry and dark places. So, buy what you can from the website. You can definitely find substitutes at the local Walmart, Winco, or Costco.

2. There are a lot of Emergency Instant Food Companies. Like, ReadyWise, 4Patriots, Thrive Life, Valley Food Storage, Legacy Food Storage, and Backpackers Pantry. Right now, Costco was selling the Ready Wise Emergency Food Supply Bucket (for 4 people) at the Sossaman location in Mesa. It costs \$60. So, this one you can go out and pick up at a reasonable price. (Pics attached below). Costco also has an "Emergency Food Supplies & Kits" search category as well, that offers additional emergency foods available. **Tip**: look for the foods/meals you already eat. Then you won't waste or resent your emergency food.
