

Adirondack Whitetail Deer Day Hunt

Client Packing Checklist

Prepared for guided day hunts in the Adirondack Mountains
Conditions may include snow, mud, steep terrain, thick cover, and rapidly changing weather.

Hiking & Mobility Gear

These items ensure you can safely and comfortably move through Adirondack terrain.

- Sturdy, broken-in waterproof hunting boots
 - Quality wool or synthetic socks (extra pair recommended)
 - Gaiters (highly recommended in snow, wet brush, or blowdown)
 - 3000 cubic inch day pack or hunting pack
 - Trekking pole shooting stick (optional but helpful in steep or icy terrain)
 - Blaze orange hat and/or vest (required by NYS law during firearms season)

Hunting Gear

Your guide will handle strategy and navigation, but these are essential personal items.

- Legal firearm or bow, properly sighted in
- Ammunition/arrows/bolts (bring more than you think you'll need)
- Valid New York State hunting license & deer tags
- Knife (fixed or folding) for field use
- Small headlamp or flashlight (with fresh batteries)
- Optional: binoculars
- Optional: rangefinder (especially for archery)

Your guide will assist with tracking, field dressing, and recovery — but having your own basics is still important.

Clothing (Layering Is Key)

Adirondack hunts often involve periods of movement followed by long sits or slow still-hunting.

Base Layers

- Moisture-wicking top and bottom (wool or synthetic)

Insulation Layers

- Insulating mid-layer (fleece, wool, or lightweight puffy)
- Heavy insulating layer for cold sits

Outer Layers

- Quiet, weather-resistant hunting jacket
- Matching hunting pants
- Waterproof or water-resistant shell if rain or snow is expected

Accessories

- Warm hat
- Gloves or mittens (bring a lighter pair and a warm pair)
- Neck gaiter or face mask (wind protection & warmth)

Avoid cotton whenever possible — it holds moisture and gets cold fast.

Water, Food & Hot Drinks

Cold-weather hunts burn calories and demand hydration. We do provide lunch and snacks, but if you have a personal preference you are more than welcome to bring your own.

- Water bottle or hydration system
 - Thermos with coffee, tea, cocoa, or soup
 - High-energy snacks (jerky, trail mix, bars)

Electronics & Small Essentials

Keep it simple, reliable, and cold-weather ready.

- Fully charged cell phone
- Portable battery pack / power bank
- Phone charging cable

- GPS app or handheld GPS (optional — your guide will navigate)
- Personal medications

What You'll Need at Home for Game Processing

Your guide will help field dress and transport your deer, but plan ahead at home.

- Clean coolers with ice (or access to cold storage)
 - Space in a garage, shed, or basement for hanging (if self-processing)
 - Game bags or clean tarps
 - Sharp processing knives
 - Cutting boards
 - Vacuum sealer & bags (recommended)
 - Labels and marker for packaged meat
 - Contact info for a local butcher/processor (if not processing yourself)

Strongly Recommended (Often Forgotten)

- Extra socks
 - Extra gloves
 - Blaze orange rain shell
 - Hand warmers
 - Small towel or wipes

Final Notes from Your Guide

- Pack light but smart. Comfort equals patience, and patience kills deer.
- Let your guide know if you have concerns about mobility, cold, or equipment — we can often adjust plans or make recommendations ahead of time.
- Adirondack deer hunting is active, physical, and incredibly rewarding — being prepared makes all the difference.
