Daily Exercise Review: Crowds on Demand

 Service Definition:Crowds on Demand hires actors to serve as crowds for impactful advocacy campaigns, demonstrations, PR stunts, crowds for hire, and corporate events.

How It Works:

- Professional actors and models can be deployed nationwide within 24 hours.
- Clients can specify attire, signs, and behavior. They get paid about \$20 or \$30 an hour.

Cost Structure:

- \$50 per person.
- A minimum event cost of \$25,000 is required to bring people to events, which for a crowd of 500 people at \$50 per person would cover one hour. For 100 people, the cost would be \$5,000 for an hour.
- **Use Case Example:**One person paid \$25,000 to hire a crowd to follow him for a day as paparazzi to appear like a celebrity.

Ethical and Practical Considerations:

- Can artificially boost the perceived popularity of a politician, product, or social issue.
- If exposed as a paid crowd, backlash can occur; people may feel manipulated and angry, potentially causing a political candidate to lose an election. For instance, a mayoral candidate spending

\$50,000 to hire a crowd could face public anger and manipulation accusations, potentially losing the election.

Daily Exercise Assignment: What is AstroTurfing?

- **New Assignment:**A second daily exercise, "What is AstroTurfing?", was assigned for immediate completion.

- **Value and Logistics:**Worth 10–20 points. Copy your final paragraph and save it in a Google Doc for your paper.
