The literature review contains concept and theory or theoretical framework or previous research that have relevance with your research, show research gaps and research novelty.

3. **Research Method**

The research method consists of stages that are used in a research process, types of research approaches, methods, types and sources of data, data analysis techniques. 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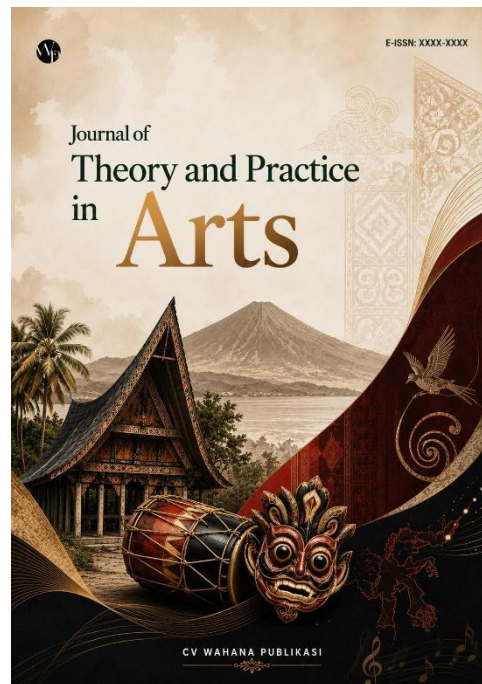


Figure 1. Cover of Journal of Theory and Practice in Arts
