Course Title: AP English Literature and Composition

Length of Course: 1 year (1 credit)

Prerequisite(s): English 11-3 or 11 AP Language and Composition

Course Description: AP English Literature and Composition is an introductory college-level literary analysis course. Students cultivate their understanding of literature through reading and analyzing texts as they explore concepts like character, setting, structure, perspective, figurative language, and literary analysis in the context of literary works

English Competencies

- Students will demonstrate the ability to closely and critically comprehend, analyze, and critique a variety of increasingly complex print and non-print literary and informational texts.
- Students will demonstrate the ability to produce effective writing for a range of purposes and audiences.
- Students will demonstrate the ability to employ effective speaking and listening skills for a range of purposes and audiences.
- Students will engage in research/inquiry to investigate topics and to analyze, integrate, and present information.
- Students will demonstrate the ability to use the tools of technology (including digital media and the internet) to gather, interpret, and analyze information and create shareable products.

Titles: May include The Kite Runner, Hamlet, Song of Solomon, Wuthering Heights, Death of a Salesman, Their Eyes Were Watching God, Crime and Punishment, Metamorphosis, Frankenstein, The Round House, The Stranger, A Streetcar Named Desire, and other AP level titles, including selected short stories and poetry.

Assessments: Essay tests, objective tests, quizzes, papers, projects, homework, and oral presentations. English rubric is used in grading writing assignments.
