

| CHAFEE GRANT Chafee Grant | Chafee Grant Pays up to \$4,500 annually to help foster youth pay for college career/technical vocational training. Administered by the Commission (CSAC) through interagency agreement with California Department of Social Services (CDSS) Federal and state funded grant subject to annual availability Eligible participants must complete one-time Chafee application | |
| Calkids California Kids Investment and Development Savings Program | Foster Youth Benefits: Foster youth get up to \$1,500 automatically deposited in their CalKids account This includes an additional \$500 specifically for being identified as foster youth Money can be used for college expenses like tuition, books, supplies, and equipment The money is invested and grows over time until you're ready to use it How to Access: Check your eligibility at https://calkids.org/ No application needed - it's automatic if you're eligible | |
