Can you believe it's already November? If you're a senior, Thanksgiving Break should be the time to complete any last-minute college applications. Here are some more tips!

All Community

- Are you an adult community member who would be interested in sharing your career experience with high school students? <u>Sign up here!</u> Career Presentations begin in December and continue throughout the winter.
- **Career days** begin in December. Parents, asking your student what he thought of the presentation can be a great way to start a conversation about planning for the future. Students, take some time to brainstorm questions for our guests.
- Are you a first generation student? (That means neither of your parents received a bachelor's degree in the United States.) You could be a great candidate for CU Boulder's Precollegiate Development Program. Twin Peaks has partnered with CU Boulder to support first-generation students prepare for college. Students and their families attend presentations two Saturdays a year about preparing for college. Then, in the summer between your junior and senior years, you will spend three weeks on the CU Boulder campus taking a college class and completing your college application. Students who complete the program receive a scholarship of at least \$4000. And the whole program is free!

9th Grade

10th Grade

- <u>Tips for Planning a College Visit</u>: Make a commitment to visit one local college between now and the end of the school year. (<u>CU Boulder</u> could be a great choice!) That experience can be a great reference point as you begin to figure out what you're looking for in a school. And some schools offer <u>incentive grants</u> if you visit campus, either in person or virtually.
- Start thinking about financial fit: As you begin your college search, it's important to think about cost. Experiment with the Net Price Calculator to get a rough estimate of what you might pay for college, and start the conversation with your parents or guardians.

- Lay the groundwork for fee waivers: Have you filled out the free/reduced lunch form? While all students receive a free lunch in Colorado, eligible families can fill out this form to receive free retakes of the SAT, lower AP test costs, and free college applications. This simple step can save you hundreds of dollars.

12th Grade

- Interested in scholarships? We will be using seminar time to apply for local and national scholarships.
- Our school goal is to have all of your applications submitted by the end of Thanksgiving Break. This gives you the best shot at financial aid, scholarships, and rolling admissions. Keep going, and feel free to reach out to your seminar teachers or Ms. Cook for help!
- FAFSA is still scheduled to become available in December, so keep an eye out to start filling out the form.
- <u>Supplemental essay responses</u>: This is your go-to guide when applying to colleges that require more than a personal statement.
- <u>Check your applicant portals and emails</u>: Portals are the place where colleges keep applicant information and where you can update contact information, monitor application status, upload and track documents, and view the final admission decision. If you miss a request for more information or a document, it could jeopardize your admission chances, so make it a habit to check regularly.
- The Great College Essay Test: Assess how ready your essays are to submit.
