or all that is around us or we might see a this which comes out of our present day life 17:55

an image of george floyd in minneapolis painted so that everyone in the community everyone in

18:01

the state everyone in the world in fact could see the face of george floyd and the names of others

18:08

who died upon the streets of the united states at the hands of police it was a way of saying

18:15

something to the public it was a way of taking the feelings of one person and transforming them

18:22

into something more we see similar public art in things like a black lives matters 18:31

mural painted upon a street so not just saying it to one person but everyone who drives by

18:37

sees it we even have this wonderful example in which an entire street took on black lives

18:43

matter so that from the air people could see it people could know that there was a sentiment there

18:51

you know in these times we also see other ones this is one of our covid times 18:57

a mural painted to remind us that love is still possible even in times when we have to wear masks

and then there's also this delightful one of our dear friend greta and painted underwater

19:12

and on top of water on a side of a building so the message is she's trying to work with climate

19:18

change and the issues of sea level rise and all that for all of us she doesn't have our addresses

19:25

she's not going to suddenly show up in our living room but through public art 19:30

we get to see a message that is larger than ourselves and so in this i want to bring us 19:37

to attention to what public art is some call it graffiti but i call it public art the way in which

19:43

hearts and hearts and minds and minds and mouths and mouths and ears and ears and eyes

19:49

can communicate with one another in a way that is both personal and very public and so a thought if

19:58

you were to have and work that you created out in public what would it say what would you want

20:06

to put on a wall somewhere that you would want others to see and know what you had to say in life

20:14

and what message have you ever seen on a wall somewhere in your life that you took home with you

and has become a part of you may these thoughts be with all of us in all of our times and all of our

ages remember that though we cannot collect our plate offering in person if you would 20:37

21:46

six years ago in 1948 bill and my mother gladys found that beautiful church you see 21:53

in the background that is the church of the reconciliation universalist unitarian

21:57

down on oneida square and for both of them it was like coming home

22:04

my father was raised an episcopalian my mother a methodist but they had always 22:09

had many many questions in their lives about religion so they found a home in that church

22:15

then in 1978 my father was very instrumental in building the building that you're now 22:21

seeing is our worship home on higby road so i want to light my candle today for my father bill becker

22:30

and also for all those visionaries who across the decades

22:35

have meant that liberal religion lived here in utica well for all that has been shared both

22:43

in words here but also in the chat and in our hearts and our minds we give thanks 22:50

that we can be here with each other for each other in the spirit of our community candles

23:16

is

23:31

of compassion

23:46

giving of life

24:12

well now i invite you to turn your attention to a story and it's a story

24:19

out of the hebrew scriptures out of the book of daniel and i'm going to basically tell 24:25

you the version of it because whenever you get it out of the scriptures itself 24:29

there's always problems with it because of the language or all kinds of theological overlays but

24:36

this is the story as i learned it in the sunday school at this congregation when i was a child

24:43

long long time ago there was a king in babylon and his name was balthazar and he was a very proud man

24:54

and he loved to party and so one point he called together a thousand of his lords and all of his

25:03

top ranking officials and he was drinking wine with them in fact he drank so much wine he thought

he ought to be good to others so he suddenly commanded that his servants bring in all the

25:16

various things that his father nebuchadnezzar had brought from jerusalem which included all kinds

25:23

of goblets and bowls and everything else and soon there was all kinds of wine drinking going on and

25:31

people were raising up praises to various gods the gods of gold and silver of bronze and iron

25:38

and wood and stone everything they drank from they were praising but then suddenly a hand appeared

25:48

and the hand began to write upon the wall of the chamber and it was mysterious writing that

25:59

belgium couldn't understand he couldn't figure out what it was so he said you know we need to have

26:04

someone who can come in and interpret this for us he said bring in all the wise people we can find

26:10

all the magicians all the chaldeans all the various people that might interpret this and 26:16

whoever can give me an interpretation of this i will give them a gold necklace i will give

26:21

them purple robes i will make them the third most powerful person in the entire empire well in came

26:29

all the enchanters all the magicians and looking at the writing on the wall they said 26:36

i haven't got a clue don't know what it means don't even know how it got there all very 26:42

mysterious well suddenly the queen broke in and said oh my king what are you doing you've got

someone in your midst his name is daniel and he is very very good at interpreting all manner of

26:56

things and so in interpreting all manner of things he might be able to tell you what these words mean

27:04

well daniel was summoned and he took a look up at what was on the wall 27:09

and he said you know first of all i hear you're making promises about giving necklaces and

27:15

robes and power keep those for yourself you're gonna need them and then he said 27:21

here is what i see up on that wall there are four words and there are var very simple words

27:32

parses whoops got to get this way parson now what does this mean and at this point daniel

27:38

said very simply the first two have to do about the division of things the taking away of things

27:46

one is that your power is going to diminish and your kingdom is going to fall 27:54

your days are numbered the days of your kingdom is numbered and then tackle you have been weighed on

28:02

the scales of justice and been found wanting and parson your kingdom will be divided up

28:11

among foreigners and strangers now balcazar didn't like this he was willing to give all sorts of

28:18

stuff to daniel but he didn't like what he heard so he heard it and then he put it out of his mind

28:26

and at that point however maybe he could have made a better choice and we'll talk about that because

by that nightfall balcazar was dead and by the next day his entire kingdom was divided up among

28:41

others and so the story of balthazar's feast and that wonderful axiom of the handwriting on the

28:51

wall so i want to go back to this story as part of my sermon reflections i want to go back to what

29:00

we know is going on in this story and you'll see why i'm thinking of it in a few moments because i

29:06

think these times have called this story back to mind so remember we talked about nebuchadnezzar

29:13

he was the great king and well he thought he was a great king and the more he thought he was a great

29:19

king the more and more he took pride in himself oh i keep moving my screen i'm sorry he he would

29:27

take pride in himself and then when he no longer thought he had to give any allegiance to god

29:34

or to anything of value other than himself when he saw himself as more important than the law more

29:40

important than any kind of spiritual thing he fell from grace he fell from power he became it says in

29:47

the original scripture like an animal living among the animals but then he had an enlightenment that

29:55

his low status was because he didn't revere things of value that he saw himself as more powerful than

30:01

everyone else and so the first part of the story is about how nebuchadnezzar 30:06

upon realizing that he had to have something larger than himself something he remembered always

30:13

that was more important than just his own power and his own glory was restored to power

30:20

but then following his death we get balthazar and mothers are has this strange occurrence

30:28

in which a hand shows up and writes on the wall we get that wonderful phrase the handwriting on

30:34

the wall out of this and he doesn't know what to make of it and so he has to call 30:40

in this boy from jerusalem basically daniel to tell him what it means

30:46

and in the end even when he is told what it means he doesn't take it to heart he's more interested

30:54

in wine drinking praising all the gods of gold and silver and stone and wood and glass and all that

31:03

than to talk about the most meaningful things in life now one of the questions is why would i think

31:10

about that well one it takes me back to when i was in the sunday school in this congregation

31:15

and i would think about such things because we were told these stories i think one of the goals

31:21

of our religious education in those days was to make sure that we universalist unitarians

31:26

were some of the most religiously literate among the youth in our community so we knew

31:31

all these stories and we knew where those common phrases came from like handwriting on the wall

31:37

but i've been thinking about it more recently for another reason and this is it 31:42

more and more we're having people talk to us about what's going on in the world 31:48

and in all the screens what do we see they're always in front of bookcases 31:56

bookcases which are sort of a form of handwriting on the wall you know it's you can see what's out

32:02

there you get someone standing there and i don't know about you but i find myself doing something

32:08

when they're talking in front of the bookcases i find myself turning my head and wondering

32:16

what have they been reading in fact i stopped hearing them and i start thinking about what

32:22

books are on their shelf what is there that they're trying to talk about 32:28

that they're not really talking about and so i think about what libraries look like 32:33

those backdrops we often get the idealized backdrop that looks like a simple everyday

32:42

library one of things we discover in this modern world is that white bookcases 32:46

are very important and they need to be filled with books and books that we might wonder about

32:51

what it is this person has been reading okay i'll fess up i'm going to show you one of my bookcases

32:58

yep there it is it's um we've got the uh there it is that's the uh meditating buddha dog there's a

33:06

picture of my daughters they're in that frame there's volumes of poetry that my wife edited

33:17

many things up on that bookcase but why am i talking about this 33:23

because all of us probably have bookcases or the equivalent we have the cases in which we

33:31

keep the things that are very important to us and we put them behind us as a backdrop to who we are

33:38

we use these things as sort of a proof of here's all i've read here is all i know 33:45

here's everything that you need to know about me summed up by the things that are behind me

33:52

sort of like our handwriting on the wall and so the question is if you stand in front of 34:00

your bookcase what am i going to see what books are going to be there what books will tell me

34:08

about you but that's only half of the question i may see the books you put in your bookcase

34:17

i may see the books you claim to have read i can see the books that you actually probably have read

34:24

but i want to suggest for all those people who are pundits on tv 34:29

all those people sitting in their well-appointed libraries and to us that that's not enough 34:37

you know i'm sure there are people who walked by that wonderful public art for george floyd

34:45

looked at it said they were moved by it but then went home and didn't change their lives at all

34:55

i'm sure there are people who have seen greta thunderberg and her plea for climate awareness

35:03

we've seen public art like the one we saw of her

35:07

but then went home and didn't do much about the climate i'm sure there are those who have

seen the black lives matter painted outside lafayette square on the street in washington

35:21

and said yeah that's how it ought to be but then the question is have they gone 35:25

home and changed anything in their lives have we gone home and changed anything in our lives

35:35

to show that our reading the black lives matter to show that our seeing greta's image to show

35:44

that seeing george floyd on that wall to see an awareness of all that has changed us in any way

35:54

the bookcase i really want to see is not the bookcase filled with everything you've ever read

36:03

i don't want to see a set of slides of every piece of public art you've ever seen 36:08

but rather the more select one what books would be behind you if there were books that you have read

36:18

and you have so read them and learned from them that your life has been changed by them

36:26

what is it that's been so important that you have not only learned from it 36:32

but you have remembered it for days and weeks and months and years take a moment

36:41

think in your life what book could be on your bookcase what handwriting could be on your wall

36:50

that you have not only taken to heart but taken to spirit and moreover taken to action 36:59

this i think is the real challenge of these times it's very easy to sit in the midst of 37:04

all kinds of commentary whether it be from a foolish governor like the one i have in florida

or maybe from a wiser one like the one you have here in new york

37:15

or maybe a leader in the world or maybe a scientist like dr fauci who do you listen to who

37:25

do you take to heart who teaches you the things you need to know so that you change your life

37:34

that's why i was thinking about that story about balthazar's feast because nebuchadnezzar in the

37:40

story the great wise king who fell from grace and then learned and remember returned to the throne

37:47

with a better understanding of what it meant it wasn't just about himself but belthazzer 37:54

on the other hand he is told fry daniel very specifically what's going to happen 38:00

kingdom gone him gone everything divided up he'll be a nothing and he hears it and he rewards daniel

38:09

ford he says oh yeah i've read that like the handwriting on the wall but nothing changes and

38:17

that night he dies and by the next day his kingdom is divided up among foreigners and strangers

38:30

what books have you claimed have made a difference in your life but which in fact right now you can't

38:38

even account for what differences they made and by contrast what book or books 38:47

have you in your life read and so taken into your spirit that you are different because of it

38:57

i'll share a couple that should be on that back bookcase back there 39:01

for me and maybe it'll awaken in you some other books as well somewhere back in that bookcase is a

copy of henry david thoreau's walden when i first read that and read it slowly and thoughtfully

39:19

i glimpsed another way of looking at the world of taking in the natural world as an important part

39:27

of who i am that i'm not just the one that dominates that i'm not just the one that 39:32

creates but i'm also the one that co-creates and coordinates and lives with a much larger world of

39:41

being i remind myself of this every time i sit and do nothing in front of a beautiful sunset and feel

39:51

the awe of it i remember what was in that book every time i look at a single tree and think about

39:59

its magnificence i think about it every time in a stillness i hear the eternal chime of all meaning

40:09

book that's up there and it's actually on the shelf let me see if i can point to it 40:15

there it is is that thin gray volume the great dissenters it was a book that was in the church

40:22

library back when we were on oneida square and i read it too it was a story about those people

40:28

who in their own times were willing to stand up take a stand even as it was not 40:34

socially or culturally welcomed they were the great dissenters oliver wendell holmes for example

40:42

ralph waldo emerson susan b anthony those who were willing to take a position 40:49

that was not popular but which expressed the values they knew were important to them

40:57

to me that was so so important and still is to know that there are others before me 41:04

who have rather than be counted among the many are willing to be accounted just by themselves

41:11

because in their descent they speak a larger meaning that they know in their heart

and their spirit also somewhere up there is mary oliver's poetry i know it is because it's a book

41:23

i've traveled with for 25 years so in those moments of despair those moments of doubt those

41:30

moments of question i can take it out and read again and be reminded of what i learned from her

41:37

what i learned from her about seeing grace in every moment possibility in every hour 41:43

and the shaping of a life as being a task worth living these are the things i remember there's

41:51

a lot of other books up on that shelf i've read i couldn't tell you what's in them they 41:57

didn't do much for me obviously and they didn't stick with me in a powerful way 42:03

but there are the few the important ones that we learn from and then we remember our learnings

42:11

so what are the books that have shaped you and how have they changed your actions

42:17

and your lives this becomes the great question we have to deal with 42:22

how will we be together and will that changed person the one that has learned and remembered

42:28

make a difference in this world or will we walk past the murals of public art 42:34

will we see the people in front of all their books on television will we in ourselves glory in what's

on our bookshelves and what we have read in our lives but not be any different because of it

42:49

what is the handwriting on your wall how are you changed by it and will you remember those changes

43:00

as you live out your life in relationship to others i hope we all can do all of that 43:11

now in just a moment we're going to sing a hymn it's number 150 in the hymnal all whose boast

43:17

it is and this is a hymn i remember growing up with because it basically promises the fact that

43:25

you may espouse something you may say you believe something but if you are not taking action

43:31

all those beliefs are for naught hymn number 150 all whose boast it is

43:51

oh it

44:06

free and brave if we do not feel the chain when it works on mother's pain

44:18

are we not based in indeed slaves unwilling to be freed it is

44.44

no true freedom is to share all

44:58

to make others free they are slaves who feel to speak for the fallen and the weak 45:10

they are slaves who will not choose

45:26

must think they are slaves

45:40

and now we come to the time of closing of our gathering we extinguish the flame of 45:46

our chalice but not the light of truth the warmth of community or the fire commitment 45:52

these we carry in our hearts until we meet again blessed be

life continually provides us with more than we have ever known before we are invited into

46:11

knowing in deeper and wider ways and it's so easy to watch a program here a movie there

46:17

pick up an article here or see something on facebook and say ah i know that now 46.24

but the real knowing in life is the knowing that becomes so much a part of you 46:31

that you are it and it is you and you act from that core of who you are 46:39

may we proudly not fill our bookcases with so many volumes that we never will know which ones we've

46:46

read but rather have at least the focus to know what it is that we've seen and heard and learned

46:54

and remembered so that the writing on our wall leads to true action blessed be and amen

when it rains it pours but you didn't need to notice

47:29

it ain't raining anymore it's hard to breathe

well the sky is
