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Abstract (11pt, bold, center)

Abstract must be written in English, in single paragraph and no more than 200 words. Abstracts contain clear statement of the background, objective, methods, results, and conclusions/implications.

Keywords: should be written in no more than 5 (five) words and alphabetically order

Abstrak (11pt, bold, center)

Abstrak must be written in Bahasa Indonesia, in single paragraph and no more than 200 words. Abstracts contain clear statement of the background, objective, methods, results, and conclusions/implications.

Kata kunci: should be written in no more than 5 (five) words and alphabetically order

Introduction (Calibri 12pt, bold, center)

Introduction describes the background and objective; it should be written efficiently and supported by references. Introduction describes the arguments on why the submitted article contains an interesting research and why it is important to be conducted. To answer that, the introduction should contain the background, state of the art of the research that was previously conducted in the same topic and gap analysis to show where the research contributions were made to the development of the topic discourse (novelty). The Introduction section concludes the objectives of the research to be achieved. It should be written efficiently and supported by references.

Methods (Calibri 12pt, bold, center)

Method consist these aspects and should provide clearly: research design, location, and time; sampling technique; data procedures; measurement and variables; and data analysis. The writing can be made in 3 sub-chapters as follows:

Participants

Provide an explanation of the research design, location and time of the study, respondent sampling techniques, and the number of respondents involved in the study

Measurement

Contains an explanation of the instruments used regarding the references. operational definition of each variable, how many items are used, the scale used and cronbach alphas.

Analysis

Explain how the data has been collected as intended. Analysis of what is used, and the tools used

Findings (Calibri 12pt, bold, center)

Findings, explain the results of the research using tables, graphs, or pictures. This should be a concern for the author to explain the data not just read it.

- The title of the figure is the same as the title of the table. Can stand alone, separate from the manuscript
- Each table and figure should be mentioned and narrated before the table and figure. Do not discuss all the numbers in the table. **The maximum number of tables is 6.**
- Findings present the empirical results of the research conducted. It is strongly recommended that the findings be written in different sections for each variable or result.

- Images should be of high quality (1200 dpi for line art, 600 dpi for grayscale and 300 dpi for color, at the correct size). Images must be provided in one of our preferred file formats: EPS, PS, JPEG, TIFF, or Microsoft Word (DOC or DOCX) files are acceptable for images that have been drawn in Word.

Sub 2 (Calibri 12pt, bold, center)

Finding is strongly recommended written in different sections for each variable or finding. This part contains results obtained. Table must be presented as shown below, typed in TNR 10 pt, single spacing, AutoFit Window, and in case of extending to the next page must repeat the header. Figure must be presented clearly (no blur), located in the center of the page.

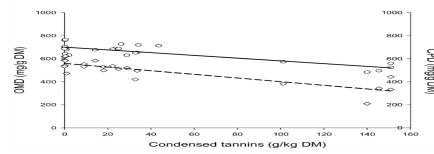


Figure 2. Relationships between dietary condensed tannin concentration and organic matter digestibility (—, full regression line; $OMD = 701.2 - 1.19 CT$, $P < 0.001$, $R^2 = 0.701$) and crude protein digestibility (---, dashed regression line; $CPD = 250.7 - 1.39 CT$, $P = 0.001$, $R^2 = 0.730$) in the *in vitro* studies.

Figure 1. Title should be brief and clear, located under the figure or graph, only the initial word is capitalized

Discussion (Calibri 12pt, bold, center)

Discussion should show relevance between the results and the field of investigation and/or hypotheses and supported by references or previous empirical researches. Results that are already described in the results section should not be repeated in the discussion section. Comparison with other research results also serves to indicate the position of the research conducted in the middle of the discourse of relevant topics. Also write down the limitations of the study.

Conclusion and Recommendation (Calibri 12pt, bold, center)

Conclusion (Calibri 12pt, bold, center)

Conclusion should be in the form of response from the intended purpose and is not intended as a summary of the results. Advice is in the form of follow-up (implication) to be done in connection with the findings or conclusions of the author. Conclusion should be written briefly or in numbered list.

Recommendation (Calibri 12pt, bold, center)

Based on the research finding, the author should give recommendations for related parties, such as policy makers, Non-Government organization, and other relevant institutions. The authors also must give recommendations for future research. Recommendation should be written briefly or in numbered list.

Acknowledgment (if any, 12pt, bold, center)

Acknowledgments (optional) containing a thank you to those who deserve (donors/sponsors), materials contributor, and research facilities.

References (Calibri 12pt, bold, center)

- References are preferably publications from the last 5 years with 80% from journals, listed alphabetically by author's last name and year of publication.
- Complete the doi of each journal, if there is no doi, write the url of the article. If taking from research gate, do not enter the research gate link but must go directly to the journal url directly.
- Book citations are strongly discouraged.
- Write a complete bibliography according to APA style.
- References should also come from the Journal of Family Science (if relevant).
- Each article must cite at least 3 articles from the journal of family sciences. Please check the topics that are in line with the article.
- Check any references to original sources (author name, volume, issue, year, DOI number). Please use the Reference Manager Application like Mendeley, Zotero. JFS adapts reference writing in the APA style model. Some examples of references are presented below:

1. Book

Format:

Author, A. A. (Year). Book title (edition, if any). Publisher. DOI or URL (if available)

Example:

Kotler, P., & Keller, K. L. (2016). Marketing management (15th ed.). Pearson.

2. Journal Article

Format:

Author, A. A., Author, B. B., & Author, C. C. (Year). Title of article. Journal Name, Volume (Edition), page. <https://doi.org/xx.xxxx>

Example:

Smith, J. A., & Brown, L. K. (2020). The effects of social media on youth development. Journal of Social Research, 45(3), 123-135. <https://doi.org/10.1234/jsr.2020.56789>

3. Newspaper or Magazine Article

Format:

Author, A. A. (Year, Month Date). Title of the article. Name of Newspaper/Magazine. URL

Example:

4. Online Source (Website)

Format:

Organization/Writer, A. A. (Year, Month Date). Title of the page. Website name. URL

Example:

World Health Organization. (2021, June 15). Mental health and COVID-19. WHO. <https://www.who.int/mental-health-covid19>

5. Thesis/Dissertation

Format:

Author, A. A. (Year). Title of thesis/dissertation (Unpublished thesis/dissertation). Name of Institution.

Example:

Johnson, M. T. (2019). The impact of digital tools on education (Unpublished master's thesis). University of California, Berkeley.

6. Source from Edited Book Chapter

Format:

Author, A. A. (Year). Chapter title. In A. Editor & B. Editor (Eds.), Book title (pages). Publisher. DOI or URL (if available)

Example:

Hall, S. (2014). Cultural identity and diaspora. In P. Williams & L. Chrisman (Eds.), Colonial discourse and post-colonial theory (pp. 222-237). Routledge.
