Dear Church Family and Friends,

A few weeks ahead, I tried to anticipate what a health screening might entail as a requirement for hospital chaplaincy. My first thought, "I'd like to lose a few pounds before then."

The morning of, expecting examination of several orifices, I made extra sure ears, teeth and tongue were clean. Having been forewarned to dress in business attire for a new id badge photo, I arrived early, sat in the waiting room prepared and began to read a book entitled, *Final Gifts*, a thoughtful compilation of experiences between hospice nurses, patients and families.

Done, the nurse escorted me down a hall toward the exit and asked, "Do you have any questions?" (Of course, I did.) Remembering past experiences, I asked, "What about a TB test? Don't you do those anymore? I'm used to getting my skin pricked then returning days later to have the site read." "No, we draw blood for that."

"Well, don't you require a urine sample? I had to do that before." (I recall feeling like I'd been arrested: closely monitored, pockets emptied, purse put in a locker, told

to enter a bathroom whose toilet held dyed water and water at the sink turned off lest accuracy be compromised while testing for illegal substances.)

No," she said as she shook her head and walked beside me. "If we suspect you're under the influence, we'll do a random test. Security will escort you during your shift to determine if you are or not. Right now, we have what we need," well assured that everything they wished to assess would be revealed by the blood draw.

But even that seemed different/better than expected. She didn't warn me, and I didn't "feel a pinch". In fact, the morning's overall experience caused me to wonder whether we Christians get it wrong as far as understanding God's examination of us: those times we imagine having an appointment of accountability, a time during which we're prescreened to determine spiritual health or worthiness. At home wearing a new set of clothes, the morning deserved reflection. "Wow. That was nothing like expected. I shook my head in disbelief, so surprised was I that they didn't measure, observe, examine or test for things of which I'd prepared.

Instead, the tasks followed a unique agenda.

Suddenly, it seemed reasonable and quite possible for me to think that God will do likewise. Perhaps God won't measure, observe, examine or test the things we prepare for all our lives. After all, many hospice patients seem to die in peace without fear. I wonder if instead of what we envision as terrible or frightening, every major life transition follows God's unique agenda.

Might every one of God's tests be accomplished by sampling Jesus' blood? Then the results are his but come back in our name. He makes us pass; we obtain clearance because of what he did, not what we accomplish. Our good report has nothing to do with making wise decisions or worrying for there is nothing we *can* do to make ourselves better, more tolerable or presentable to God. Even if effort appears remarkable by our own estimation, no amount of self-discipline or sacrifice matters. Things recommended are for our benefit, not part of a test.

As God escorts each of us toward the next exit, may we find that the door swings in a different direction. May we find ourselves upon a new path, cleared to proceed, empowered by God's will for us. We may not understand how things that used to matter don't anymore or how God figures out different ways to assess spiritual health, but hopefully, we'll realize these things:

Is it possible that we misunderstand what's important? Might our fears be unfounded? Could those things we anticipate with discomfort, i.e., the critical scrutiny we dread, be experienced as hospitality and compassion?

While governments, institutions and other societal systems continue to impact lives, have negative effects, appear cold and calculated as they protect their own interests, God isn't like that. God welcomes everyone's presence. God identifies who belongs. The chosen are included as members of God's workforce, accepted representatives of God's established kingdom.

Our willingness to be tested and submit Jesus' blood as our own ensures that his results stand as ours which changes our status. We are granted intimate access, insider benefits and all that entails. There's no need to anticipate God's screening as a harsh examination of those things which usually remain hidden or unclear. Assessment is a welcome determination of being accepted as is without a pinch, feeling personally proud or dreading the result.

Be at peace and anticipate God's love toward you during your next anticipated and/or unexpected time of trial or testing. When you appear before God, discover as so many others have, that the experience is neither scary nor unfriendly.
