If the university is not involved at all with the academy, it does deem pointless for the academy to be on campus when the space could be used for something that is beneficial to campus. Seeing the police academy participants walking in a very militaristic style on campus is very off putting and very uncomfortable. The police academy should be placed in a more appropriate space off

campus, since it is not a Niagara University benefactor besides the location. Our campus should not be discussing matters of police brutality and racial injustice while at the same time allowing the police academy to remain on campus.
