# TechnoSoc: Sociologists of Digital Things

## General guidance

If you've never used Slack before, I recommend checking out this brief <u>overview</u> of how it works. There you'll learn the basics: what a channel is, how to interact, how to set up your profile, etc.

## What this group is and how to join

This Slack channel is for sociologists who study digital phenomena in any capacity and/or who use new digital methods to study social life. We help one another with questions we have about research, readings, teaching, jobs, and more. We also organize community activities for those who are interested. The only condition for entry is a substantive interest in the sociology of digital life (a student interested in the field, a profess or studying this work, an industry researcher, etc.). To join, apply <u>here</u>. We encourage <u>downloading</u> the app because it makes it easier to participate.<sup>1</sup>

### Expectations for participation

Once you're in, you should know what is expected to participate – check out the <u>rules</u> before sending messages across the community.

#### Channels

Channels are discussion rooms that are tailored to different topics and purposes. You can find them on the left hand side (marked with #) of your Slack interface. Here is our current list and a general overview of what happens in each:

#ai ml: Discuss artificial intelligence, machine learning, and society. #all things bipoc poc: Discuss race/ethnicity in research. #amas: Events where we "ask me anything" (AMA) with invited quests. #celebration: A new publication, a new job...a new puppy? Celebrate it here. <u>#conferences cfps</u>: Share or read about upcoming conferences and calls for papers. #community website: Weigh in on what goes on the TechnoSoc website. #dataresources: Information about datasets to use or related topics. #games and research: Discuss social, cultural, human components of video games. #general: General watercooler talk – no topical constraints! #industry mentorship: Participate in a mentoring program for industry work. <u>#industrywork</u> Discuss topics related to those currently working in industry. #internships: Information about internships: how to apply, where to apply. Discuss influencing/influencer culture. Also juicy YouTube drama. <u>#influencing</u>: #intros: New to the Slack? Introduce yourself here! #internships: Discuss all things related to internships – applying, etc. #labor: Discuss work, labor, and technology research. #misinfo polarization: Discuss research and news about online misinfo and polarization. #mondaystandup: Where we host our Monday ritual to share what you're up to. #news: Discuss recent news articles relevant to the community. #nlp text and language: Discuss computational methods for analyzing textual corpora. #novelsnovelsnovels: Share and discuss non-academic reading. #postphd academicjobs: Post academic jobs, read about such jobs, discuss such jobs. #postphd industry: Post industry jobs, read about such jobs, discuss such jobs. #publicwriting: Learn about how to write about research for public audiences. #researchquestions: Ask for advice on a project, reading suggestions, etc. #rules: Learn about the rules for participation and suggest new ones. #students: Meet other students, discuss topics relevant to other students. #teachingquestions: Ask for advice about teaching, suggested readings, etc.

## Community activities

#### Ask Me Anything (AMA)

meeting, we do a close reading of one CSS article, sometimes members try to reproduce
the code in the article. We maintain <u>a reading list</u>, which has our schedule, a Zoom link,
and often choose the bi-weekly reading from this list.

#### Beverage-agnostic TechnoSoc Happy Hours

#### **Expert Database**

# Specific interests

I am looking for a job

- Be sure to regularly check out <u>#postphd\_academicjobs</u> and <u>#postphd\_industryjobs</u>. You can use both of these channels to find job postings and, critically, to discuss questions you might have about the application process.
- Those of us who work as social scientists in industry are trying to demystify the process. We created a living document <u>here</u> to provide guidance around industry research work. We also have an <u>#industry\_mentorship</u> program you can join, either as a mentee or a mentor. <u>#internships</u> is another important part of the tech industry hiring process.

## I need help with a research project

- Research is the bread and butter of what we do, and this Slack is designed to be a space where you can get help and offer feedback to others on any phase of their research about digital things.
- <u>#researchquestions</u> is the key channel to ask for advice or offer it: Which methods should I use? What readings should I check out for a particular topic? Is anyone free to review a draft of a paper? What advice do folks have for where to submit my paper? Who wants to collaborate? Ask it all here, and help others with those questions.
- We also have a growing number of channels that focus on specific aspects of the research process. They include <u>#dataresources</u>, for those who need access to datasets or want to share them or discuss data in general (who doesn't love talking about data?); as well as <u>#nlp\_text\_and\_language</u> for researchers interested in using computational methods for analyzing text. We have an ever-growing list of channels for research sub-topics: <u>#ai\_ml</u>, <u>#all\_things\_bipoc\_poc</u>, <u>#games\_and\_research</u>, <u>#influencing</u>, <u>#labor</u>, and <u>#misinfo\_polarization</u>.

## I need help with my teaching

• <u>#teachingquestions</u> is a great place to ask for advice about teaching or give advice to others: What suggested texts would others recommend for a particular course topic? What digital approaches to instruction might help my teaching? Ask it all here.

## I want to celebrate a milestone

- We all know that as researchers our milestones are few during what can be the quite lengthy process that is scholarly work. You are encouraged to share your milestones in <u>#celebration</u>, and you are also encouraged to celebrate others' milestones. Some ideas for what to celebrate:
  - Admission to a graduate program

- Being interviewed for an article or writing an article that is shared to the public
