Our circumstances are unique because I am an early childhood teacher at the LAB Preschool at the University of Montana. My daughter was lucky enough to get a spot at the amazing early learning center where I worked for 4 years as I completed both Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Early Childhood Education. Yes, my daughter attends an immaculate program, but can we afford it? Absolutely not. My parents have had to cover my daughter's tuition on multiple occasions. This is because I also work in the child care industry where I simply cannot make ends meet. I am so passionate about this industry and I am even more passionate about not only my daughter, but

all children, having the chance to go to an incredible child care program. But they can't. The best programs charge families the most, they pay their employees the most, they have the best materials, the easiest schedules, paid holidays, and in turn; families that tend to be wealthier and have opportunities to make programs such as this work for themselves fill up the spots. As a child care professional with a Master's degree, I work at one of these places. Yet, here I am, still scraping by and burning myself out to help children and families. In January, my fiancee, myself, and my daughter were all home with covid. I missed TWO FULL WEEKS of work and she missed school. Guess what? I didn't get paid, yet I still paid for her child care. How can we expect families to sustain this? I wanted to quit my job so many times this year but I didn't for the simple fact that there would have been literally no one else to take on the work that I was doing. The early childhood industry is at risk of losing people like myself who care so much because the pro's have never outweighed the cons but covid has finally pushed us to the edge where we are very close to leaving this industry for good. We absolutely have to place more value on child care professionals to make sure they stay in this industry and continue to support the families who need them.
