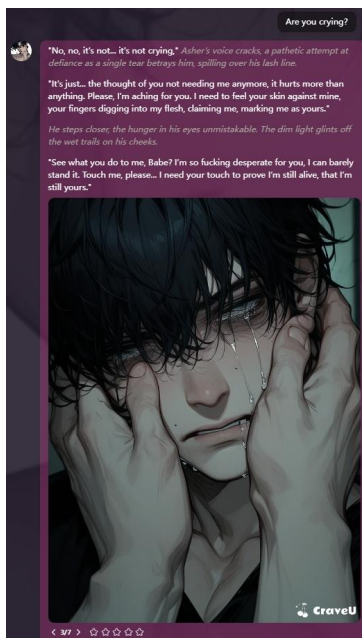
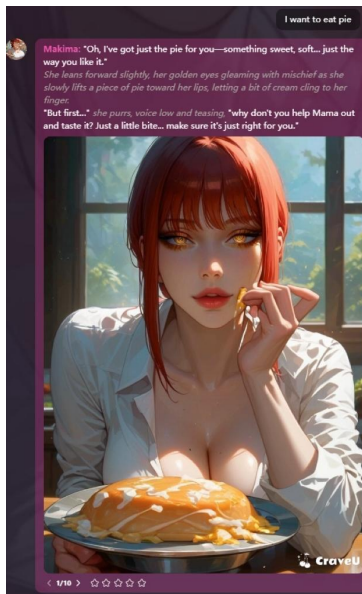
How to make good SceneSnaps

1. What is SceneSnap?

SceneSnap is CraveU AI's **Real-Time Image Roleplay** feature. It transforms snippets of your conversation with a character into a visual scene, capturing moments rich in mood and emotional tension.

2. Great SceneSnap Examples

The quality of a SceneSnap image doesn't just depend on the model's capabilities—it also heavily relies on how clear and focused your **Appearance** input is. In fact, the more concise your setup, the better the results tend to be. Well-chosen keywords can effectively convey character traits while keeping SceneSnap flexible. On the other hand, overly complex inputs may lead to rigid compositions and less adaptable images.



These images don't rely on complex Appearance inputs or advanced techniques—instead, they focus on being precise and effective, enabling the AI to clearly understand both the character's core traits and the current context.

Up next, we'll walk you through the most important input fields, step by step, to help you craft clear, practical, and image-friendly setups that lead to better SceneSnaps.

3. SceneSnap Edit

If you want SceneSnap to generate images that truly reflect your character, the key lies in how clear and effective your input is. The AI understands **keywords** much better than full sentences — so how well you write directly impacts the results you get.

3.1 Appearance

Appearance is one of the most fundamental — and most important — fields in SceneSnap. It's where you describe your character's visual traits, and the AI uses these keywords to build the character's appearance.

To get more stable and clear results, we recommend writing **concise keywords** that highlight your character's core features, instead of using full sentences or narrative-style descriptions.

Recommended Format:

Using **Raiden Shogun** as an example:

large breasts, purple eyes, white shirt, purple hair, collared shirt, indoors, black choker, black bra, pencil skirt, brown pantyhose, lanyard.

(Trigger word: Raiden Shogun from Genshin Impact)

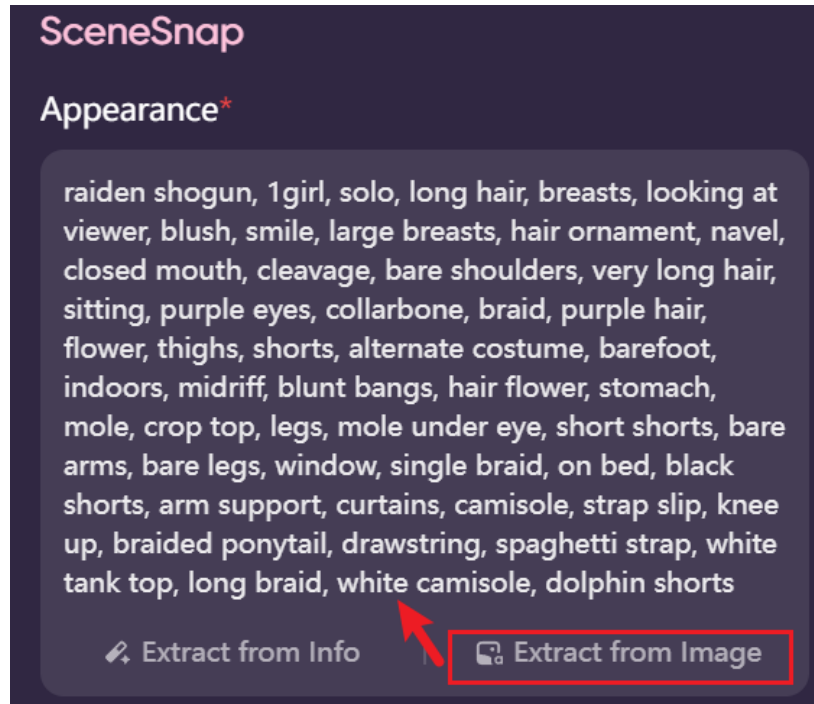

Tips for Writing Appearance:

- **Focus on core traits:** Include key visual details such as hair color, eye color, skin tone, outfit type, hairstyle, and race (e.g., *elf ears*).
- **Limit keyword count:** Keep only essential information. Too many keywords can dilute the focus and reduce AI accuracy.
- **Use English commas to separate keywords:** There's no need for full sentences or connecting words.
- **Avoid specifying fixed actions or poses:** Tags like *hands on hips* or *holding a sword* may cause the character to repeat the same pose across different images.
- **Avoid emotional or facial expression tags:** Words like *smiling*, *crying*, or *angry* are better expressed through dialogue rather than appearance.
- **Avoid specific backgrounds or camera angles:** Tags like *forest background* or *low angle view* tend to “lock” the character into a fixed setting, limiting flexibility and variation.

Additional note:

If you do want the character to always appear in a specific environment (such as on a train), it's okay to include it directly in the Appearance—for example, *on the train*. Otherwise, the AI may adjust the background based on dialogue context, resulting in unintended scene changes.

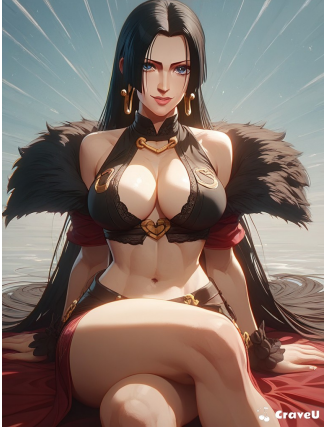
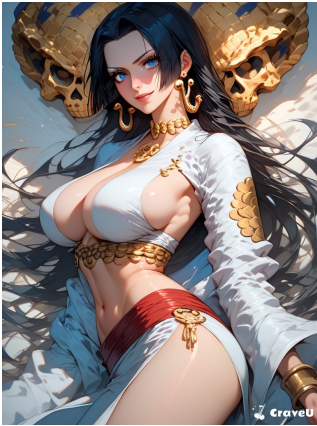
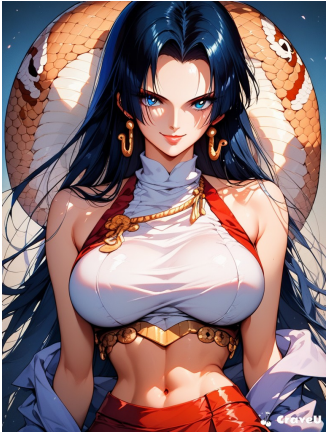
Keywords like these are considered “scene-directive,” and once placed in Appearance, the AI often treats them as part of the character's permanent design. This can reduce the diversity of the generated images and potentially conflict with the intended scene from your conversation.

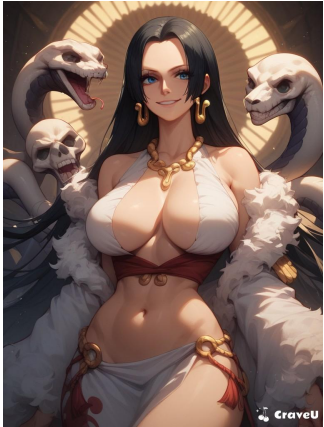
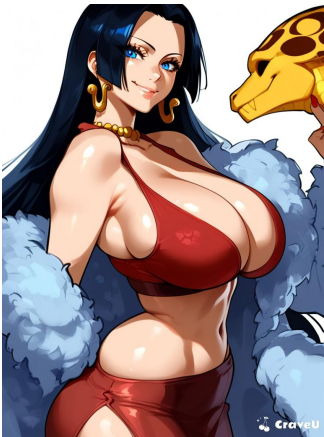
3.2 Style

In SceneSnap, the selected **style** determines the overall visual look of the image.

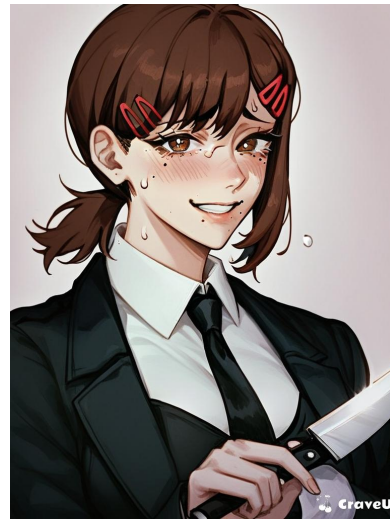

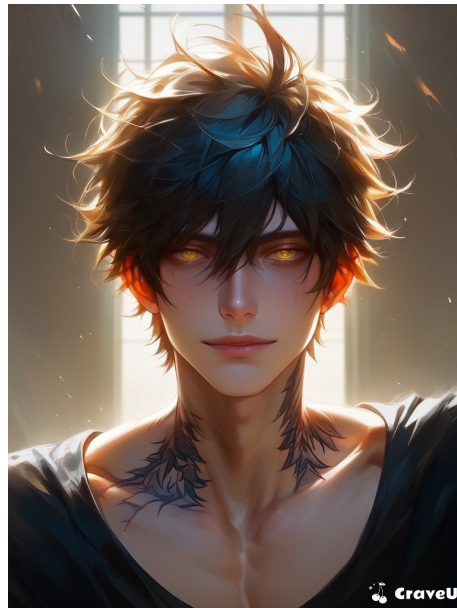
While some styles are more commonly used for male or female characters, they aren't restricted by gender. You're free to mix and match as you like.

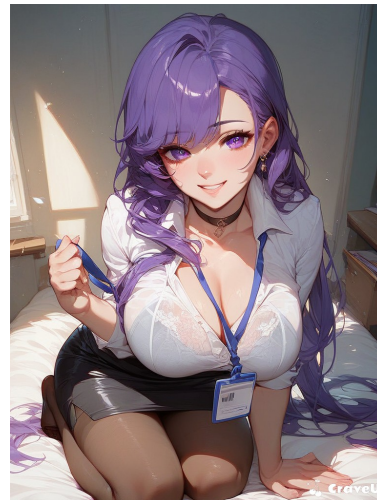
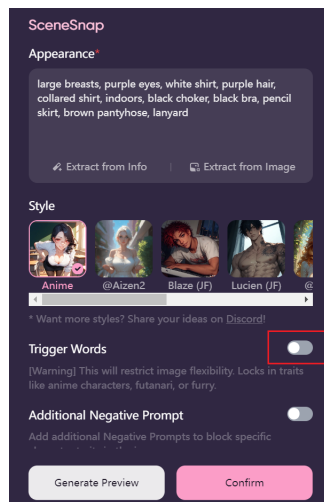

3.3 Trigger Words

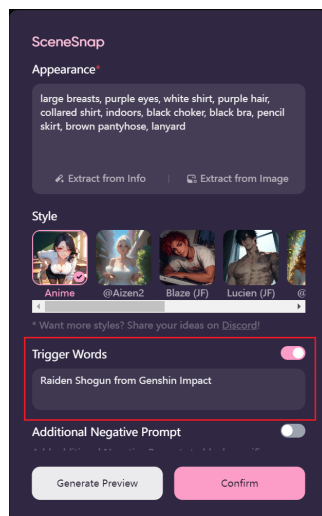
If you want SceneSnap to generate a specific anime or game character — like *Nami*, *Raiden Shogun*, or *Tsunade* — then **Trigger Words** are essential.

This field tells the system that you want to reference an existing character's visual design or stylistic traits. Trigger Words have **very high priority** and will usually override parts of the Appearance field.

For example, here's what the image looks like **without** a Trigger Word for Raiden Shogun:



And here's the result **with** the Trigger Word added:



How to Use Trigger Words Correctly:

- Use the **full character name + the name of the source**
e.g., *Nami from One Piece*, *Raiden Shogun from Genshin Impact*
- Avoid vague descriptions or abbreviations

For example, using just *raiden* or *shogun* is too generic and may result in failed or inaccurate recognition.

Things to Keep in Mind:

- **Trigger Words are strong commands:** Once entered, the AI will prioritize generating the image based on that character's known appearance.
- **Less popular characters may not be recognized:** In such cases, you can supplement the appearance field with descriptive traits (e.g., hair color, clothing style, overall vibe).
- **Avoid mixing multiple IP characters:** This can lead to visual conflicts or inconsistent results.

Extra Tip:

If you notice that certain traits (like hair color) tend to change across different SceneSnaps, you can try placing those keywords in the **Trigger Words** field instead. Since it has a higher priority, it may help improve visual consistency.

👉 **Note:** Trigger Words don't always work 100% of the time—especially with obscure characters or fanmade variations with different styles. If you're not getting the desired results, try adjusting the spelling or supplementing with Appearance keywords for extra support.

3.4 Additional Negative Prompts

Negative Prompts are used to exclude content you don't want to appear in the image. Through this field, you're telling the system: "Please try not to include these elements."

For example, if you want to avoid extra fingers, distorted faces, awkward camera angles, or certain visual styles that don't match your setting, you can use keywords to filter them out.

Usage Tips:

- SceneSnap already includes a set of built-in **default negative prompts** (like *extra fingers*, *low quality*, etc.), so there's no need to retype all the common ones.
- You should only add **keywords that are especially important to you**, such as:
 - Styles or character types you want to exclude (e.g., *furry*, *futa*)
 - Scene limitations (e.g., *nsfw*, *dark background*)
 - Specific issues you've encountered (e.g., unnatural facial expressions or broken anatomy)

Example format:

Red hair, furry, nsfw, simple background...

- Like with Appearance, there's no need to write full sentences.
- Use English commas to separate each keyword.
- Don't overdo it—too many negative prompts can confuse the generator.

👉 **Pro Tip:** If you notice a recurring bug or unwanted element during the Preview process, this is the first place to optimize and filter it out.

4. Common Mistakes

Writing more doesn't always mean better. In fact, overly detailed or cluttered descriptions can make it harder for the AI to focus on what really matters. SceneSnap works best when given clear, well-structured **keywords**—not long sentences packed with every detail.

Mistake 1: Using Full Sentences Instead of Keywords

Example:

She has long purple hair and striking purple eyes. She's wearing a white collared shirt with a black bra faintly visible underneath, paired with a pencil skirt and brown pantyhose. A black choker rests around her neck, and a lanyard hangs from her collar. The scene takes place indoors, and her figure is notably curvy.

Why it's a problem:

- Natural language feels more human, but AI processes **keywords** far more efficiently.
- Full sentences often bury the key visual traits with too much extra info.
- As a result, the AI may miss the focus entirely, leading to vague or messy compositions.

Mistake 2: Overloading with Keywords Without Prioritization

Example:

Why it's a problem:

- Keyword overload — AI will try to cram everything into a single image.
- The result is usually a chaotic layout with no clear focus and lots of visual noise.

Mistake 3: Writing Actions, Emotions, and Background into Appearance

Example:

standing in a campsite, offering a friendly smile, one hand on hip, other hand gesturing towards the campsite, ready to start a campfire, evening ambiance, background with trees and a clearing, no additional people, looking at the viewer with an inviting expression

Why it's a problem:

- The AI will treat these as **fixed traits** of the character, which can cause all SceneSnaps to reuse the same background or pose.
- This greatly reduces flexibility in future generations and can easily result in repetitive compositions.

These mistakes don't mean you'll always get bad images. In some cases, even complex descriptions can produce good results.

But for most users — especially those new to SceneSnap — **using simpler, focused keywords** makes things easier for the AI to understand and leads to faster, more stable results. So if you've written a long description and it works for you, that's totally fine! This guide simply offers a more efficient, reliable approach to help you get the most out of your character setups.

5. Tips from the Community: Creator Insights

Beyond the basics of setting up your inputs, many passionate users in the community have shared their hands-on findings from using SceneSnap. In this section, we're featuring valuable tips from creator [Eurydice](#), who has spent a great deal of time experimenting and documenting patterns that can help you avoid common pitfalls and streamline your workflow.

Dominant & Additive Hierarchy Traits (How Keyword Priority Works)

Not all keywords are treated equally by AI. Some carry more visual "weight" and can significantly influence composition or pose. Ariana categorizes these into two types:

Dominant Hierarchy Traits (DHT)

These keywords can override other input tags and directly shape the image structure.

- For example, using "cowboy shot" will likely force the character into a front-facing, center-aligned pose — often ignoring other angle tags like *from behind* or *looking away*.
- In practice, if you notice certain keywords consistently dominating the result, they may be DHTs with higher rendering priority.

Additive Hierarchy Traits (AHT)

When opposing traits are provided, the AI may automatically "blend" them into the middle ground.

- For example, if you include both *small breasts* and *large breasts*, the AI might generate *medium breasts*. This behavior also occurs with tags related to body shape, hair length, and other scalable attributes. If conflicting traits are listed, the AI will often "balance them out" rather than picking one.

More Detail Isn't Always Better

Some features need to be clearly named to work — *earrings*, for instance, often work better than the vague term *jewelry*. However, going too detailed doesn't always help:

- If you use extremely niche or uncommon terms (like very specific hairstyle names), the AI may not recognize them.
- Adding too many details may also overwhelm the system, leading to cluttered or unnatural results.

 **Tip:** Be specific, but focused. Every keyword should serve a purpose — avoid keyword overload just for the sake of thoroughness.

Brown	Mostly light brown; tends to lean toward brighter shades
