Browse for Library Books



Library books are an excellent source of information. Start by searching our library's <u>catalogue</u> for your topic. Type your topic in as a keyword search and see what books you will find! You may also browse the following book series: At Issue, Current Controversies, Opposing Viewpoints, Compact

Research, and Contemporary Issues for topic ideas. Type the name of the book series in the search box and click "series" from the drop down menu to see a full list of titles. You may also click <u>here</u> to see a list of these books.

Gale Library Databases

Online library databases offer a vast collection of current information covering many topics. Here you will find academic journals, newspaper and magazine articles, videos and audiofiles.
