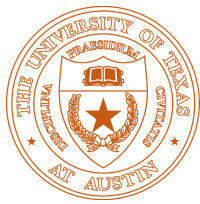

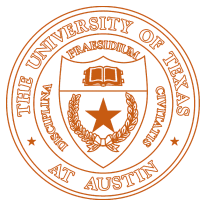
- I. Call Meeting to Order - 7:05PM
- II. First Roll Call
- III. Approval of the Minutes
 - a. Approved by Unanimous Consent
- IV. Open Forum
 - a. Zachary
 - i. A student who lives and parks on Campus. At the end of the semester last semester, he parked his car in the wrong spot and got a ticket. He was given three tickets by PTS before receiving an Automated email. He's spent hours on the appeal process trying to get the tickets appealed with somewhat little success. This is a problem because if he had just gotten an email, he would have moved his car after the first ticket. The email came three days late. He would like SG to get PTS to change the automated system so that the email gets sent as soon as the ticket gets put into the system.
 - ii. Cope: Time extended by 5 minutes
 - iii. Took three tickets down to 1 and a half tickets after appeal. PTS' logic behind why the tickets should not get removed was in reference to the email notifications. PTS' rules and regulations ask students who live on campus to only check their cars every three days. They claim the emails are just a notification
 - iv. Cope: Do you plan on appealing any more times?
 - 1. Zachary: I exhausted two appeals and that's all that they give you. I went in to try and speak with someone and they blew me off.



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- v. Engel: What college are you in, and do you know if there a spot open for representative in your college? You have shown initiative to help, and if there is no spot would you be open to accepting a position as Director in an organization that deals with this?
 - 1. Zachary: I am in the college of engineering. I would be happy to join an organization that deals with parking! But I have no knowledge of how to join.
- vi. Cope: Is anyone else allowed to appeal on your behalf? And if so, can I appeal on your behalf?
 - 1. Zachary: In their own rules and regulations, they state that the second appeal is your final appeal. But they can't prevent you from emailing them.
- b. Omar Rios
 - i. With student government. Currently serving as the Housing Policy Director. Out of on-campus housing availability. Ut currently has 7500 on campus bed spaces and about 8000 incoming freshmen. About 1500 of those students have their leases renewed on campus. There are also spaces reserved for athletes and honors students. Students are placed on a first come first serve basis. There is a significant portion of freshmen who do not live on campus. I want to focus on first gen and low-income students who do not live on campus. Skyrocketing housing prices have forced us to live further away in north campus, Riverside, or some few places in West Campus. Given these costs, students are given three choices: be in debt, be far away or be somewhere unsafe, or be in debt.
 - ii. If you are interested in helping support these students, please reach out to me.
 - iii. Muraly: Do you have any ideas already...
 - 1. I have some ideas, but the ideas go beyond the power I have in SG. This issue involves the number of bed space on campus. UT staff has already made efforts to increase this, but they have been stalled due to outer issues. The most basic thing we can do here that I think will help students is the amount of money they receive in grants to live either on campus or off-campus. Housing application separate from admissions application is to keep lower-income students off campus... Becuase we don't have a lot of spaces for low-income students to live on campus we must find a way to help them. They need access to their classes, the SSB and the PCL. In their further years they can pick to live where they'd like (West Campus, etc) but they should have the experience of living on campus their first year.



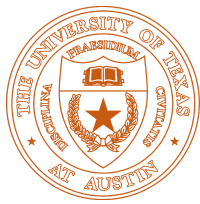
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- iv. Matos: Have you taken this up with other leadership? Do you know of other efforts?
 - 1. I recently learned of the West Campus Housing Association, but I do not know of other efforts
- v. Shah: Thank you for ! Have you talked to UT administration about reserving space for students who are low-income?
 - 1. I don't remember the name, but there is one person in charge of giving out UT leases in April/March. Filling bedspaces on campus is never an issue.
 - 2. I did talk to someone about that. The issue about that is that we open up issues on segregation. The lowest housing cost is Jester West, which is about 10K to 11K per year. If we say that Jester West is the residence hall for low-income students than it would become to be known as the dorm for poor kids. We want to equally distribute students across all the halls on our campus.

V. Guest Speaker: Gregory Fenves, *President of The University of Texas at Austin*

- a. Thanks for inviting me! I'm glad I could be here. I've been here before. I graduated from college 40 years ago. One of my most formative experiences in college was getting to be in Student Government. As I think back at the work I'm doing at UT, it's a lot of trying to get everyone to pull for a common goal. I am going to bet that 40 years from now, each of you will have a story to tell about your UT experience and how important it participate and learn how to lead. You are all very special and I'm glad to see what you are doing.
- b. A couple of things: This is my fourth year as President. I've had a great working relationship with Student Government. We were dealing with a big issue on campus: Jefferson Davis statue. Alejandrina and Mickey continued work on this issue.
- c. We've also done some other things! We fixed the entrance from Campus. It was the class gift of the Class of 2017, which was a student government initiative. The class of 2017 was the first class that graduated under our four-year graduation initiative.
- d. Let me lead into housing.
 - i. Omar: In this process of forming different committees. So far just leading on this issue by myself. Want to ease the modes of communication.
- e. We have 7500 beds, we have more than 40,000 students. We need more beds.
 - i. 1st reason: Cost of housing in Austin increasing
 - ii. 2nd Reason: Housing is a big impediment to the 4-year graduation rate.
- f. Through the collection of data, we know that freshmen retention is very dependent on the distance the student lives from campus. When we started realizing this issue several

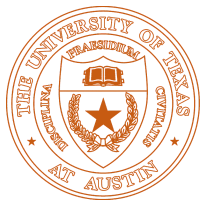


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years ago, we noticed that we need to provide better housing. We have students from all socioeconomic backgrounds. Housing is where we see a lot of inequities develop. We are going to start a major strategic plan with the City of Austin. The city wants to be a partner with us. We are also working with the West Campus apartment association. Our goal is to provide on-campus housing or program housing for all freshmen. We need to start planning for this. We would love to be a partner with student government. Many of you have worked with Dean Lily; housing is in her portfolio. Also, the new housing director from the University of Michigan Housing. Construction projects take a long time, but we are work on these issues.

- g. Another area where student government has been influential is mental health. Our referral to mental and behavioral health have increased.
- h. Thanks to SG we have eliminated Copay for some mental health services. We've improved upon the CARE program, its now in 13 schools and colleges. PHarmacy and LAW school will also participate CARE program soon. Provides mental and behavioral counseling.
- i. One other initiative: College to career has been very important.
 - i. The idea that students need to start thinking about career planning very early in their college careers. Not every college has strong career centers
 - ii. We will remodel the second floor of the FAC to be a college career center
 - iii. It will be coordinated with existing career centers but is a program.
- j. It's spring in an odd number year: the legislature is in session. I spend a lot of my time working with elected representatives of this state. Talking with them on higher education.
 - i. In general, there is strong interest in what we do and strong support
 - ii. About two weeks ago we had Orange and Maroon day great student turn out!
 - iii. For those of you from Texas, find out who your rep and senator are and go by and visit them. It is important that they hear what you are learning at UT. We had a great experience. In this regard, A&M and UT are in this together. Together we do \$1.5 billion in research a year
- k. Opened up for Questions:
 - i. Dave: I know that UT is bound by statute in terms of how many students from Texas it can attract versus the nation. What are your plans to increase UT's profile nationally and internationally?
 - 1. Fenves: Admissions always gets a lot of interest. We had a record number of applications this year. We are unlike any university in this country in the way we operate. Admissions are governed by state law. Texas is the fastest growing large state in the country. Texas is as well underserved in education. There is huge demand to come in here. It is hard to tell a



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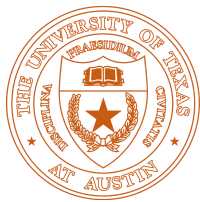
student , or family that we would not be able to admit them because we want to take in someone from New York or California. Although, we are a hot spot in both these areas. NY and Silicon Valley have the largest concentration of UT alumni outside of Austin.

2. One of my goals is to increase the pool of international students
 - a. Also wants an increase in Graduate Applications. International graduate applications up 6%.
- ii. Deutch: What is the status of reinstating the rivalry?
 1. Fenves: I am very public on this, we are all for playing A&M. We offered them two dates for a Home home game last year. They're complicated. They decided not to do, so we signed up with Alabama. We are excited about it.
- iii. Time extended by 5 minutes
- iv. Kampmann: I work on the session floor. There has been ton of interest in higher ed, but more community college based instead of university. What do you think that means for UT?
 1. Fenves: We received funding from the legislature. I actually like it when higher ed is not at the top of the agenda for sessions. This is the best start for a budget. Both the house and the Senate, their base budgets, are close to what we asked for. The big issues in the legislature are big issues for the state. Public school finance is one of them. This affects you, and you, siblings.
- v. Vanden Hoek: Thank you for taking my question! Can you comment on trying to get more lower-income students to come to UT?
 1. Fenves: I mentioned earlier, we want socioeconomic diversity. There have been some great economic studies on the effect of higher education on social mobility. We are simplifying financial aid. We can develop more resources for financial aid (including philanthropy)When we look at net tuition, over the past ten years, adjusted for inflation, our average net tuition is less than it was 12 years ago. That was the purpose of the Texas advance commitment. A lot of the pressure is on families in a middle-income level. Texas grants are the state version of Pell grants. From a policy perspective, I'd much rather the state look at Texas grants before tuition.

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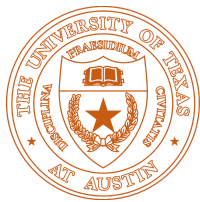

- b. Engel: I know that weeks ago I talked about safety and metal detectors in stadiums. We will start working on legislation that you will see within the next few weeks.
- c. Solder:
 - i. Working with the sustainability director to ask administration in the Union and SAC to make all their packaging compostable. Also has a meeting with dean lily in regards to this.
 - ii. Is also meeting with the people in charge of the Ghost Bike Memorial.
- d. Goodman: A couple weeks ago had a meeting with the student advisory committee for diversity. We are working on a diversity center. A have a few versions of the plan if anyone wants to see a copy of it.
- e. Rivzi: Danielle and I have been working on a first-gen ceremony. May happen 22. Looking for people to join the Taskforce.

IX. New Business:

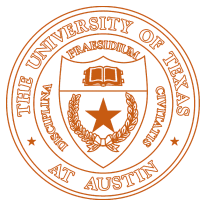
- a. J.R. 8: In Support of Universal Graduate Student Teaching Preparation Guidelines for all UT Programs
 - i. People from Senate: Trying to standardize guidelines for TAs. There are a lot of TAs on campus who do not get standardized training. There are no specific guidelines that all TAs need to meet. With this legislation, we hope to increase the efficiency of communication for both graduate and undergraduate students.
 - ii. Cope: Do you think it is possible to standardize the guideline preparation process considering how diverse the different programs are?
 - 1. Its standardization in the sense that there are minimal guidelines in place for every college. There are some departments that just don't do training at all. In the context of the legislation, there was an article in the Daily Texan about an international student who didn't understand the role of a TA and there was not proper training provided to them.
 - iii. Cope: To reiterate, you did see it's free right? No additional cost to standardize?
 - 1. There is nothing that we are specifically adding. We are raising the bar for the lowest amount of guidelines. There is no additional cost for things that are already happening now.
 - 2. There can be an additional cost if a department wants to create their own programs as well. But there is no cost from this.



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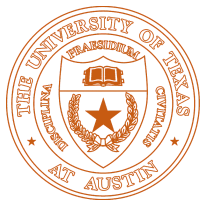
- iv. Solder: What will be done with this legislation and where will it be going.
 - 1. Once this has been approved, Samantha Fuchs is going to be heading this effort
- v. LaCrout: Is this resolution to decide the guidelines that will be standard, or simply to say that we need to standardize?
 - 1. This legislation gives recommendations.
- vi. Matos: From my experiences with TAs in the graduate level, they are often added last minute. I don't want this to prevent students from getting these positions. What is the timeline for students to get these positions? When are you expecting them to finish the training?
 - 1. The goal would be to make this a requirement. The exact timeline as to when the training would have to be finished is coming later. But we will bring these concerns up. This should not be an obstruction.
- vii. JR 8 will be referred to the Academic Affairs committee
- b. A.B. 14: Amending The Code of Rules and Procedures to Create the Soncia Reagins-Lilly Award for Administrative Excellence
 - i. Becker: Student Government has been around for a long time, and we haven't had awards! This would be a great way to empower students and reaffirm the wonderful role that administrators play. We should be recognizing that and reinforcing good relations with administrators. We will also be introducing student awards.
 - ii. Engel: If you are establishing these awards this year, do you plan on giving them out this year?
 - 1. Becker: Yes, the way it's going to work is that there will be a committee. The exec board will be blocked from receiving the award. We plan on doing this this year.
 - 2. Solder: the committee will meet in March to make
 - 3. Becker: you can make nominations
 - iii. Referred to rules and regulations committee
- c. A.B. 15: Amending The Code of Rules and Procedures to Create the Student Government Excellency Awards for Outstanding Leadership and Community Impact
 - i. Becker: For a student who has made a significant contribution to Student Government. Awarded to one student in SG every year.
 - ii. Community Impact is geared towards students who make a contribution but who might not have a formal role in Student Government.
 - iii. Engel: Is there a reason that you all are choosing to exclude the assembly board



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1. Solder: meant to ensure that the recipient is someone who does not hold a leadership position and took the initiative to put in the extra work.
 - iv. Murely: What about assembly board members who are also
 - v. Lucas: Can speakers be nominated?
 1. Solder: no, as they are on the ASsembly board.
- X. Unfinished Business:
- a. A.R. 13: In Support of San Jacinto Bike Safety
 - i. Gavel in the Speaker Pro-Temp
 - ii. Solder: I was approached by the campus bike alliance to author legislation. 2 requests: ghost bike memorial, and to create protected bike lanes.
 1. Protected bike lanes have been in plans before but never created.
 2. No Questions
 - iii. Engel: Move to approve A.R. 13 by Unanimous Consent
 1. Seconded
 2. Approved!
 - b. A.B. 13: Amending The Code of Rules and Procedures to Change Students United For Rape Elimination (SURE) Walk's Agency Identity
 - i. Benson: To summarize, changing SURE Walks name, eliminating the acronym. We do not eliminate rape, and we are an inclusive agency.
 - ii. Bonin: What does it mean by trying to be broader? Explain your duties.
 1. We are an interpersonal reduction agency. We only do on campus to on campus locations are off campus to on campus locations. We have a partnership with LYFT. We don't just focus on the issue of rape, but as well race relations, religion, etc.
 - iii. Matos: motion to approve by voice vote.
 1. Approved!
 - c. J.R. 7: In Support of M.A.P. (Medical Access Program) Direct Messaging for Uninsured Students
 - i. Hussain: There haven't been any changes
 - ii. Lucas: You explained the issue really well and articulated it really well. Thank you for that.
 1. Hussain: Thank you! It was a year plus long effort.
 - iii. Kim: One challenge is that the students involved have to be an Austin resident. What about students from other towns?
 1. Hussain: The best numbers that we have to work on is a report with the Bakers institute. We want to approximate the population we would be working with. The number was about 21.5%. We are dealing with likely a



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smaller number than that. We are just sending the messaging out. As far as whether they qualify or not, they do have to be Travis County residents. We are doing our best to make sure that students that are eligible have this available.

iv. Matos: Motion to approve by voice vote

1. Motion Approved!

d. A.R. 11: In Support of the University of Texas at Austin Adopting the Chicago Statement for Free Speech and Student Rights

i. Bonin: One statement was mentioning the lawsuit that UT is in. I notice these concerns. The statement was removed. It was passed unanimously by the Government Affairs committee. As well, last Tuesday Camilla and I met with some reps from the Dean of students office; there was a mixed response. They believe that UT's policies are in line with the statement (though there are some exceptions. They had a lot of concerns about how it would affect university culture. Solder

ii. Solder: Would you please further the concerns about campus climate that these representatives expressed?

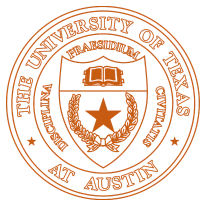
1. Bonin: They were mostly worried about how it would affect students who may feel like the rug is being taken from under them as far as protections on campus.

2. Kampmann: Clarifying that this is about free speech and not university org demonstrations. There could be a perception that this could be commenting on past protests. For students who have been affected by protests the past, there have been lots of calls to the Student Services building with comments about how these protests put students at risk. This is more about free speech, we want a comfortable environment in class spaces to have a productive discussion and let people feel safe to bring up their opinions.

3. Bonin: This is an aspirational piece. It would not change University policy, but rather is just an aspirational statement.

iii. Shah: Just to clarify, this is more about a recommendation and less about policy change?

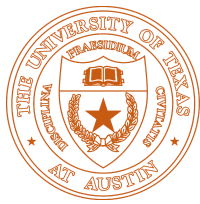
1. Bonin: A rep had mentioned that no policy changes could go through until the lawsuit is finished. The University adopting this would not change policy, though that could be done later. Current policy is already fairly aligned with this.



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2. Cope: ultimately this is an issue in the image the university gives with prospective students. When they come on campus will they feel this is a place with civil discourse and ideological diversity.
 - iv. Lucas: Can you mention the example that you gave that is at the beginning of the statement of the speaker that was at the University of Chicago that sparked this original statement.
 1. Bonin: Don't remember the exact person, but the person was a communist speaker that had gone on campus. This would possibly be an example of where free speech intersects with a controversial speaker.
 2. Kampmann: I am very much a Democrat and believe that this is a good idea.
 - v. Vanden Hoek: Move to extend question period.
 - vi. Kierra: How does this affect civil discourse?
 1. Bonin: In terms of demonstrations, the Chicago statement doesn't conflict with any of UT's demonstration policies. Some of what has come under fire is penalization of something considered hateful or harassment. With such a broad definition at UT, this could scare people from speaking out.
 2. Kampmann: WE can't dictate what environment should be on campus. I don't know whether this is going to have a positive or negative effect on campus. The whole purpose behind this is for students who are coming to look at UT. There are 130 other universities around the world who have signed onto this policy. This is to something that is internationally recognized and to send a message that free speech is something that UT supports. Free speech should not be the same as hate speech.
 - vii. Vanden Hoek: Can I be added as a sponsor?
 - viii. Vanden Hoek: Move to add myself as a sponsor
 - ix. Vanden Hoek: Move to approve by voice vote

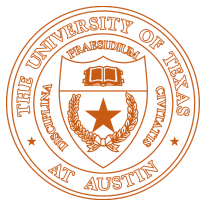

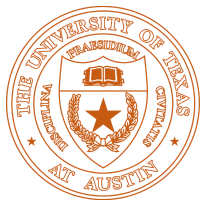
