


Monthly Radiotherapy Clinical Fellow Blog

Jo and I are currently reviewing the data from a North West service evaluation about the perception of the role of the therapeutic radiographer in



prehabilitation and rehabilitation, some really interesting results are emerging and we hope to put together some proposals following this working closely with GM prehab and other prehab/rehab leads.

Jo and I continued our virtual tour of the Macmillan geographies this month and welcomed the opportunity to speak to the Macmillan Partnership Managers about the scope of therapeutic radiographers practice and to request that teams consider whether or not job descriptions could be opened out to AHPs and not to limited to nurses which is often the case. Following this tour we have also helped one of the geographies for a bid for a specialist therapeutic radiographer; fingers crossed they are successful.

Jo and I have also heard from other therapeutic radiographers about the challenges of applying for roles outside the radiotherapy department in oncology which are often open to only nurses despite therapeutic radiographers having years of oncology experience.
