## The School of Business Undergraduate Program Student Community Standards

The School of Business (SB) Undergraduate business program aspires to provide an environment that supports all learners and to be a welcoming place where everyone feels safe and respected. We value intellectual growth, critical thinking, academic honesty, and personal integrity. We recognize multiple and intersecting types of diversity including demographic (e.g., age, race, gender, sexual orientation), experiential (e.g., abilities, culture, background), and cognitive diversity (e.g., how we learn, speak, think).<sup>1</sup> All members of our community are held to high standards of ethical behavior within The SB and the broader PSU community and with potential/current employers and other stakeholders.

## Undergraduate students and student organizations pledge to:

- Reject all forms of discrimination when witnessing it by speaking up, or asking for help in speaking up by reporting it when you are witnessing unkind of discriminatory behavior.
- Communicate honestly and respectfully with faculty, other students, staff, and the public and listen to other peoples' opinions with a willingness to be changed by what you hear.
- Show consideration for differences of opinion.
- Inform themselves of academic and co-curricular requirements and policies including classroom expectations and norms.
- Respect the time and expertise of faculty, staff, advisors, recruiters, employers, and peers.
- Provide feedback that is constructive and given through the appropriate channels.
- Take responsibility for your choices with regard to these expectations.
- Use PSU technology resources (networks, software, hardware, email address) ethically and lawfully and in accordance with the <u>University's Acceptable Use Policy</u>.
- Adhere to <u>PSU's Code of Conduct</u> and the <u>SB's Academic Integrity Policy</u>.

The SB Undergraduate Program takes these Community Standards seriously in order to foster an inclusive and transformative learning community described in our School's mission.
