What is the Difference between a Page and a Post on a BMCC OpenLab WordPress Site?

To add content to your BMCC OpenLab WordPress site, you have the option of creating both posts and pages. Both posts and pages have a title, and content below that title.

Key Differences

+ Pages...

are static; good for a site homepage or About page

+ Posts...

are more like an announcement or blog article

They...

Have a time stamp Have a listed author

Allow comments, by default

Have categories

Have tags

Appear in a list, in reverse chronological order (=newest at the top) by default

This <u>Infographic by kristarella</u> helps explain more details about the WordPress page/post distinction.

More Details

What is a post? | Posts show in a designated area of your site in reverse chronological order, with the newest post appearing at the top of the list of posts.

Posts are a good place to put new information or announcements about your course, project, or community. They are also a good place to publish new discussion questions, reading responses, blog entries—or any information that will become less relevant to your viewers as your course, project, or club progresses, because when you publish new posts, they push down the old ones.

One of the most useful elements of posts is that you can use their assigned categories to designate where they show on your site. If you create a post category such as "Learner Resources," then add the category to your menu, all posts that you publish in that category will show up in that area of your website automatically.

What is a page? | Pages can have the same content as posts, but they are not listed with other pages, so they have no automated order, nor do they have time stamps. Your pages must be added to your site menu one by one, in order for them to show on your site. To see a page, viewers will need to click its link from your site menu.

If you would like certain content to remain static so that your viewers will always see it when they visit your site, then you might want to create that content in pages (e.g., a course syllabus, a project description, or a club mission statement).
