International Children's and Young Adult Book Collection at the Alexander Library, Rutgers University

A representative collection of children's and young adult books, both translated and in their original language, that celebrate writing and visual style and design from outside of this country. Established in Spring, 2019.

Rationale for the Collection

- Potential for collaboration with other departments and other nearby institutions with international collections
- Potential for partnerships with National and International Organizations
- Potential for creating a regional hub for international literature in the NY Metro Area
- Outreach to community
- Support for the International Youth Literature Course

Selection Criteria

The nature of the collection: Children's and Young Adult books that are contemporary and popular in the country of origin as well as books by authors and illustrators who have won significant international awards are included in the collection. The collection includes a wide range of formats and genres including: graphic novels, nonfiction, etc. The collection is a representative collection and includes books that are:

- · Translated into English
- Originally published in a country other than the United States or published in the United States by creators from other lands.
- · Written in a language other than English
- · Written outside the United States in English.
- Global books written by a refugee or immigrant to a country other than their Homeland
- Reference books, catalogues from major international exhibitions, secondary resources.

Exceptions:

- · Books that are broadly available in a United States Public Library
- Authors and illustrators who are so generic that there are no cultural markers, that is, nothing in the text, illustration or design that make it 'feel' international
- Books that are classic in the canon of children's literature in the United States (e.g. Winnie-the Pooh, Pippi Longstocking).

Processing and Cataloging

Book Processing supplies and labels provided by the library. Books are to be cataloged by the Cataloging Department as opportunity allows.

- Books will retain their dust jackets and be covered with mylar protectors. These supplies have been ordered.
- Books will receive a label and be filed in a separate section of the Children's Book Collection on the third floor of the Alexander Library.

- To move the collection to the children's book collection on the third floor
- To prepare a poster session for the 2021 Bologna Children's Book Fair
- Completion of a LibGuide to promote the collection.

• To host virtual webinars and in-person workshops promoting international youth literature in order to feature the collection.

THE BEGINNINGS

In late 2018, I worked with Marc Aronson, faculty member in SCAI, and Doris Gebel, recently retired from Northport Library in New York and currently wan SCAI adjunct, to acquire a collection of international children's and young adult books either written in or translated into English, many of them award-winning, from Northport Library. This collection is a core piece of our vision for Rutgers, a global university situated in a highly diverse state in which a rich variety of languages are spoken in the home, to become an anchor for a regional concentration in international children's literature.

The initial collection of some 500 books is being continually updated by books acquired from publishers and at the international Bologna Book Fair, among other sources. The collection currently numbers nearly 1000 items.

WHERE IS IT?

The collection is currently located in room 108 in the Alexander Library / New Brunswick Libraries Administrative Suite. It is sorted by age level and organized by author name.

WHO'S GOING TO USE IT?

Students in the children's literature course in the Library and Information program are already using it to learn about collection development, evaluating children's literature, creating reviews, and the various important awards in the field. We anticipate that once it is cataloged and accessible, it will also be useful to language, literature, and area studies programs, early childhood through young adult education, students of litustration and book arts, and even the broader New Brunswick community for programming, education, and entertainment. entertainment.
