HAF can pay for mortgage and utility payments, internet services, property insurance and taxes, HOA fees, and more. Homeowners who meet all the following criteria are eligible: 1) income equal to or less than 150% of Area Median Income, based on family size and location (application will confirm income eligibility); 2) experienced financial hardship due to COVID-19 after January 21, 2020, such as job loss, reduction in income, increased costs due to healthcare, or need to care for a family member; 3) applying for the primary residence that is located in Arizona. Maricopa County Human Services Department will serve eligible county residents living outside the cities of Glendale, Mesa, and Phoenix. Maricopa County will serve all other cities, towns, county islands, and unincorporated areas. Assistance is provied through Community Action Program offices located throughout the county. Human Services Department Emergency Rental Assistance (ERA) Program	Rent, utility and water assistance is now available to Phoenix households affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. The Mayor and members of the Phoenix City Council have approved distribution of \$51 million in new federal Emergency Rental Assistance (ERA) dollars to Phoenix residents who need help making their rent payments and covering the cost of home utilities. The new ERA Program is structured differently than the prior CARES Act Program. Under the ERA, eligible residents may receive up to 15 months of help with past due rent. There is no cap on the dollar amount of assistance, but participants must be recertified every three months. Utility assistance includes help with current and past due amounts for residential water, gas and electricity. Those who apply for the ERA funds must make less than \$62,250 for a family of four, and must have sustained a reduction in household income due to COVID-19. While the program does not cover mortgage payments, it does place a priority on families whose income is lower than \$38,900 for a family of four and have been out of work for more than 90-days prior to applying for assistance. The program will be administered by the city's Human Services Department and the non-profit Wildfire. Applications can be submitted by phone or online.
