FAST FACTS...

- In 2017, 6.64% of consumers became victims of identity fraud, an increase of almost one million victims from the previous year. (Javelin Strategy & Research, February 2018)
- Over 1 million children in the U.S. were victims of identity theft in 2017, costing families \$540 million in out-of-pocket expenses. (Identity Force, January 2018)
- Around 1 in 15 Americans are an identity theft victim (Insurance Information Institute, 2019)
