

### Black Rock Village, 1795-1853: History & Genealogy

This guide focuses solely on sources that document Black Rock prior to annexation, 1795 to 1853. During these years, Black Rock was an incorporated village, then town, with its own government, separate from the City of Buffalo. We added links where available.

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### Frequently Asked Questions About Black Rock

### How did Black Rock get its name?

There was a large triangular outcropping of black limestone or basalt projecting into the Niagara River, roughly at Niagara and Massachusetts Street. It was about 100 feet at the north end by 300 feet at the south end. By diverting the strong river currents, it created a natural harbor. This is where the Black Rock Ferry got its start. This stone formation was blasted away in the 1820s to make way for the Erie Canal. There are no known drawings of it from the period. Photography was not invented yet, so there are no photographs of it. We have only the one rendering shown on the first page, drawn in 1911 based on written descriptions.

### What was the Mile Strip?

In 1798, the State of New York decided to survey and reserve for itself the mile of land bordering the Niagara River from Lake Erie to Lake Ontario. It released this land for sale in 1804. Black Rock developed within the footprint of the former Mile Strip. This map depicts the Mile Strip and lists its first land buyers.

#### What were Upper and Lower Black Rock?

Two hamlets (neighborhoods) sprung up in the former Mile Strip: Upper Black Rock and Lower Black Rock. *Upper* meant upstream (south) on the Niagara River and *Lower* meant downstream (north). The lower west side and Niagara St. south of Scajaquada Creek are what used to be Upper Black Rock. Riverside and Niagara St. north of Scajaquada Creek are what used to be Lower Black Rock.

### Why was there a battle over the Erie Canal?

Once plans to build the Erie Canal were approved, the villages of Buffalo and Black Rock fought a bitter competition to win the terminus of the Canal, the point at which the Canal would connect with Lake Erie. Whichever place won would experience a tremendous expansion in population, commerce, wealth, and power. Judge Samuel Wilkeson represented Buffalo's interests and General Peter B. Porter represented Black Rock's interests. Wilkeson, by building a harbor with greater capacity than Black Rock's, won the vote of the Canal Commissioners.

### **Jubilee Water Works Company Records**

The Jubilee Water Works Company, one of the first water systems in Black Rock and Buffalo, was organized in 1826 and incorporated in 1827. At the time of incorporation, it was designed to supply water to Buffalo and Black Rock by means of conduits or aqueducts from a spring located at present day Delaware and Auburn Avenues. The original board included Peter B. Porter as president, Daniel Frazer, S. C. Brewster and

# **Buffalo and Niagara Falls Railroad Company Collection** 1835

The Buffalo and Black Rock Railroad Company was organized in 1833 and opened in 1834. It operated from Buffalo to Back Rock. In 1834 the Buffalo and Niagara Falls Railroad Company was incorporated to take over the Buffalo and Black Rock Company. It extended the lines to Niagara Falls and into Tonawanda. In 1853 the Buffalo and Niagara Falls Railroad Company was leased by New York Central Railroad and was merged in 1855. A Scholar Pass is necessary to use this item.

### **Pictures**

Photography was not invented until 1839. Buffalo's first photographer opened up shop in 1840. Photography was a slow and cumbersome indoor portrait medium for its first decade or so. In Buffalo, the oldest known outdoor photograph dates from around 1850.

While we have some prints & drawings of Black Rock from the village era, the bulk of surviving Black Rock photographs in our collection date from about 1870 to 1980.

We have about 30,000 loose house & building photographs from Buffalo & Erie County. Some are online in our Picture Store.

Buffalo and Black Rock house pictures are in A-Z order by name of street. Buildings other than houses are sorted by type (church, school, factory, hotel, etc.)

### Vital Records

New York State did not pass a vital records law until 1880, so there are no surviving government-issued birth certificates, marriage licenses, or death certificates from the village of Black Rock. Instead, researchers should consult surviving church records for baptisms, marriages, and deaths.

Official birth, marriage, and death certificates for the city of Buffalo, including post-annexation Black Rock, are in the <u>Buffalo City Clerk's office</u>. We do not have copies here.
