Currently, each member of her department goes in one day a week but that will likely change at some point where they have to go in more. Elizabeth firmly believes that her productivity is up from working at home. I know that her work/life balance is more skewed from working from home. She is much more likely to work longer or answer something from home now that she is working from home than when she
