



In Response to Academic Repression Regarding Palestine at CUNY

In coalition between all CUNY Students for Justice in Palestine (SJP) groups and CUNY for Palestine, we stand in solidarity with the Borough of Manhattan Community College (BMCC) Social Justice & Equity Centers (SJEC) who have faced censorship and a series of online attacks after uplifting the Palestinian struggle through an educational event series. We commend their steadfastness in the face of the slanderous campaign against their work. A university for the people is one that defends its students and workers when they stand up against oppression in the face of reactionary demands that whitewash imperialist brutality.

On March 16, a post on Twitter attacked BMCC's SJEC's display titled "Visual Timeline of Occupied Palestinian Land," which was intended to educate the BMCC community on the expropriation and theft of Palestinian land, the ongoing ethnic cleansing of the Palestinian people, and the history of Zionist settler colonial rule in Palestine. However, and in line with Zionist tactics we've seen repeatedly used across CUNY, SJEC was falsely accused of antisemitism by multiple Zionist media outlets outside of CUNY to pressure BMCC into canceling the event series, which included taking down the visual display of the expropriation of Palestinian land over time.

BMCC's response to this malicious and completely baseless campaign, was to tell the SJEC to remove the posters without first informing the project coordinator. Since then, several BMCC faculty members have made complaints about SJEC's educational events around Palestine (including a screening of film 'Farha' and a discussion with a Palestinian student activist) and a virulent media campaign, both in the press and in online spaces, has not only revolved around smearing the event, but focused on denying the ongoing genocide of Palestinians overall.

This is a microcosm of how antisemitism has become weaponized as a political tool resulting in the dilution of its meaning and the destabilization of the ability to combat and identify actual antisemitism, such as the rising Christo-fascist movement in the United States, to not only attack and censor Palestine solidarity organizing, but omit any mention of Palestine at all in our academic spaces. The Zionist redefinition of antisemitism, with the most prominent example being "IHRA", exists to extend the settler colonial state's reach outside of its illegal borders to silence Palestinians in exile.

Of the claims made by Zionists, two of them were to deny the assassination of Shireen Abu Akleh and of any ethnic cleansing of the Palestinian people. 'Farha', the film SJEC scheduled to

present, is a historical drama of the Nakba which was the ethnic cleansing, sexual assault, and mass murder, of 750,000+ Palestinians in 1948 enacted by Zionist militias whose members then merged into the current settler army: the “Israeli defensive forces”. The educational event series, specifically the visual timeline and movie, has now been shut down, thus denying BMCC community members the opportunity to partake in learning while allowing racist propaganda perpetuated by Zionists to continue.

Instead of defending the right of their students and workers to critically engage with the ongoing occupation of Palestine, BMCC allowed revisionist anti-Palestinian propagandists to influence our educational spaces and sent out an email apologizing for the series to the broader BMCC community. Zionist groups on and off campus are now calling to host their own series of events on Zionism as part of an intimidation tactic. Meanwhile, they continue to harass SJEC team members online and via voicemail.

This shameless cowing to Zionist intimidation further exemplifies how our CUNY institutions are not separate from the Indigenous struggles of the world, but actively play a part in whitewashing academia and perpetuating violent imperialist narratives. The silencing/omission of Indigenous peoples is not a unique phenomenon in Zionist rhetoric, as Zionism is based in European settler colonial ideology as even stated by Herzl himself, and is the inevitable outcome of such an ideology. Erasure is present in various Indigenous struggles such as the struggles of the Kānaka Maoli, the Sámi, the Indigenous peoples of North America, and the Taíno people. It is a common practice amongst many settler colonies, such as the United States, which is also deeply invested in supporting the persecution of the Indigenous Palestinian people.

We reaffirm our solidarity with the hardworking members of the SJEC with action, not just lip service. This is academic censorship, and it is in flagrant violation of CUNY’s Henderson rules (#5). In defiance of this blatant attack on academic freedom via Zionist repression, we collectively launch our week-long campaign titled Palestine Education Week in coordination with student-led Palestine solidarity groups around CUNY. We refuse and denounce the imperialist and white supremacist use of “neutrality” and “both-sidesism” as academic doublespeak designed to delegitimize rightful rage at the ongoing genocide in occupied Palestine. “Neutrality” at CUNY means an administration that tolerates and is actively involved in subjugating its own marginalized community members while maintaining financial ties to weapons manufacturers and other oppressive systems and institutions. We call upon the CUNY community to stand up and join us in our campaign against not only Zionist repression, but the repression of ALL Indigenous and anti-imperialist struggles of the Global South.

We therefore demand..

1. A public apology and accountability statement written by the BMCC admin who failed to protect their workers.
2. Allow the timeline and movie event to be implemented exactly as it was intended to be by its creators.

3. To build networks of communication between Palestinian students and workers within the BMCC community to better represent them.
