## **Mother Rosalie Hill Hall** ([View Virtual Tour](#))

Mother Rosalie Hill, once said, "Beauty will attract them; goodness will lead them; but the truth will hold them." She knew our campus' location would initially attract students and faculty. She also knew that this would be the kind of academic atmosphere that would attract people conscious of social justice—and that here, a dedication to truth and equality would knit our academic community together. Mother Hill founded the San Diego College for Women, which, over the decades, has evolved into the present-day School of Leadership and Education Sciences.

The Disability and Learning Difference Resource Center provides specialized resources and services to enrolled students with documented disabilities. These services include academic accommodations, disability management counseling and coordinating with other departments (e.g., Housing, Parking, Public Safety) to provide assistance. To receive support from Disability Services, students must first contact the office and submit valid documentation. For each type of disability, there are specific requirements that must be met for documentation to be considered valid. These requirements are described on the website.

Once the disability has been verified by Disability Services, each request and/or recommendation for an accommodation is examined on a case-by-case basis and is implemented with consideration of the student's present needs, supporting documentation and the core requirements of each class. It is the goal of Disability Services to promote maximum student independence.

The office also offers consultation to students with temporary disabilities (e.g., physical injuries such as broken limbs, etc.) and to students who have health-related dietary restrictions. Students who intend to request services are encouraged to contact our office as soon as possible to discuss documentation and any other issues.

The One Stop Student Center has specially trained counselors to help students manage financial aid and student financial services in one location, eliminating the need to travel between offices. The One Stop Student Center will assist students with walk-in payments, financial aid, and miscellaneous questions. Additionally, the One Stop Student Center maintains the One Stop Services tab on the MySanDiego portal where students can perform routine business transactions on their portal 24 hours a day from any location.

The One Stop team is committed to providing state-of-the-art services for USD students. After-hours appointments are available on request. Parking permits are required on the USD campus seven days a week, 24 hours a day, and USD Public Safety enforces

Students do not need to have a University ID Card, but may benefit from associated student discounts off campus when presenting their University ID Card.

USD employees are exempt from creating a student University ID Card, as the employee University ID Card will afford you the same access to student discounts.

This is an online process that will allow you to submit a photo to the University Card Services department and authorize them to create your student ID card for pick-up when you arrive on campus for orientation.

Step 1: Login to your My.Sandiego.edu student portal

Step 2: Under the "Torero Hub" tab on the left-hand side of your screen, select "My Torero Services" from the provided list.

Step 3: Scroll down on the "My Torero Services" page until you find the "Upload USD Pics" section halfway down. Once there, following the directions provided to upload your photo for your student ID card.

### **Student Life Pavilion** ([View Virtual Tour](#))

The Student Life Pavilion is a four-story, 50,000-square-foot addition to the University Center. The SLP offers a dozen different dining options representing American, Italian and Mexican cuisines as well as Vietnamese, Mediterranean, Chinese and Japanese offerings. It also has a full-service grocery store called Tu Mercado, a farmer's market each Wednesday and offices for student organizations including a Graduate and Law student commons.

The SLP's main dining area on the ground floor serves breakfast and lunch a la carte before changing to an all-you-can-eat format for dinner. The dining area is open seven days a week (WEEKDAYS: 7-9AM for breakfast; 11AM-2PM for lunch and 5-8PM for dinner; WEEKENDS 10AM-2PM and 5-9PM).

There is also a lounge with pool tables, flat screen T.V.s and a snack bar called Frank's Lounge on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor.

La Gran Terraza features California bistro cuisine, served in an elegant and comfortable atmosphere. They offer a VERY reasonable 'business lunch' buffet from 11:30am-1:30pm in addition to the regular a la carte menu. They are again open for dinner on Fridays from 4-8pm.

O'Toole's pub provides a varied menu of hot and cold tapas, an extensive wine list and an array of local, craft beers. Happy Hour each day from 5-6pm and 9-10:30pm

Tu Mercado is a convenient shop that offers a market, groceries, deli and espresso bar - all the essentials for home and campus living. The Spirit Shop features USD clothing, gifts, cards, Torero merchandise and more and is open weekdays and weekends.

### Degheri Alumni Center

Constructed to be a “home for the USD alumni family,” it also to showcase USD’s history. It features an open air center courtyard and rear patio for receptions, a conference center, and living room equipped with yearbooks, photographs, and a fireplace.

#### Torero Stadium ([View Virtual Tour](#))

This 6,000 seat stadium hosts our football and soccer teams. USD has 8 men’s and 9 women’s **NCAA Division I West Coast Conference teams**. Additionally, we have 23 club, recreational and intramural sports on campus.

#### Missions Housing and Field House

Built in 2007, the Missions Café and Fitness Center is an 8,500 s.f. facility located in the heart of Missions housing. Equipped with cardio and strength equipment and a group exercise room, it also boasts a full-service coffee/juice bar and sandwich shop. Open usually from 7am-11pm Mon-Friday and 9am-9pm on weekends during the traditional school year.

#### Jenny Craig Pavilion ([View Virtual Tour](#))

Jenny Craig was a member of our **Board of Trustees** and the money to construct the building was given in her name as a birthday gift by her husband. It opened in 2000 and seats 5,100 basketball and volleyball.

The 4,000 s.f. McNamara Fitness Room is also located here and is open from 7AM-10PM Mon-Thurs; 7am-6pm on Fridays; 10am-5pm on Saturdays; and 2-7pm on Sundays and during regular session.

### Campus Recreation and Fitness

All students have free access to our onsite fitness centers with their student ID card or through the app. Dependents 12 and under are free. Memberships for minors 12 - 17 must purchase a membership. #### Cunningham Baseball Stadium ([View Virtual Tour](#))

The new Fowler Park was completed in 2013 to include the addition of 1,700 permanent seats expandable to over 3,000 in order to accommodate NCAA Regionals and Super Regionals and is named after former USD Board of Trustee Chairman, Ron Fowler, and owner of the Padres.

### Campus History:

In 1945, two religious leaders stood on a hilltop in San Diego and envisioned building two institutions to provide the best in sacred and secular learning. The Most Reverend Charles F. Buddy, first bishop of the Diocese of San Diego, and Mother Rosalie Hill, superior vicar of the Society of the Sacred Heart, founded those colleges just a few years later.

Feb. 1952, the San Diego College for Women opened its doors with 50 students..

Spring 1954, the men's institution, known then as San Diego University welcomed

- 39 students in the College for Men and
- 60 students in the School of Law.

In 1965, the Second Vatican Council encouraged Catholic colleges and universities to “unite”, so the schools merged in 1972 to form the University of San Diego and was a single campus accommodating 2,500 students.

The University of San Diego is actually not named for our location but rather is named after a Saint – but NOT San Diego Diego de Alcala who just received official sainthood in 2015, but rather St Didacus – a saint who couldn’t even read or write! The University of Alcalá de Henares near Madrid served as a model for USD's founders, both through its architectural style, and in its mission to be an educational institution that serves society and the human condition.

Today, USD is a nationally ranked Roman Catholic institution with 1300 plus full-time and part-time faculty members, 5,700 undergraduates, 100 paralegal, 1750 graduate and 950 law and PhD students. (8,500)

Rather than being a member of a religious order, the University is governed by an independent board of trustees. However, our mission as a university is based on Roman Catholic principles of **ethical conduct** and **compassionate service**. So, while Mass attendance is not required, students are **required to take 3 courses in theology**, in any religious area they choose.

We have over 66,000 alumni in all 50 states and 141 countries with 63% living in CA and an endowment of \$470M as of June 2014

The 180-acre campus now houses buildings that encompass more than 2 million square feet and provide educational, administrative, residential, athletic, dining and support services.
