Throughout the academic year, we have taken time each month to "Track Thoreau" through our nature journals and reflections. We have also taken time each month to read some of Thoreau's *Walden* and then hold onto our thinking by chatting with a School AI bot and responding to the reading. Like a biologist who seeks to gain a better understanding of bears by tracking them down in their natural habitat, we have sought to better understand Thoreau and transcendentalism, by reading his work and exploring his "natural habitat" - the outdoors.

The goal of this summative is for you to demonstrate an authentic, unique and personal understanding of Henry David Thoreau's work, *Walden*, and the philosophy of transcendentalism.
