- 2. Pick out a syllabus to work on. Preferably, it should be for a class you'll be teaching this fall. It can be a draft. It can be an old syllabus or one from someone else who previously taught the class. It could be something closer to a first-day handout than an official course syllabus, especially if you are a recitation instructor or teaching in a tightly coordinated course. The point is that we'll be making edits throughout the workshop, so you need something to start with.
