What Are the Principles for Trusted Elections?

- The Principles for Trusted Elections is a cross-partisan framework grounded in five shared commitments: honest process, nonviolent campaigns, secure voting, responsible oversight, and trusted outcomes.
- They affirm that all eligible voters deserve fair access, that election rules must be followed and enforced impartially, and that certified results should be respected.
- Signing the Principles Pledge is a public way to stand up for integrity, transparency, and peaceful participation in our democratic process.

Why We Endorsed the Principles

- Trust in elections is the cornerstone of civic participation, but in recent years, that trust has been eroded by polarization, misinformation, and threats of violence.
