## Terms:

- **Annotated scripts**
  - Annotated scripts have comments that provide relevant information about the script. They are not typically considered accessibility features but add engaging details and enhance the reader's experience.

- **Transcripts**

- Transcripts are text that has been converted from speech in an audio or video recording, needed to understand the content.

They are used for accessibility purposes.

- **Land acknowledgements**

- According to the Native Governance Center, land acknowledgments are “the practice of recognizing the Indigenous past, present, and future of a particular location”

- **Content warnings**

- Content warnings are a notice to the audience at the beginning of a piece of media that they will be exposed to potentially sensitive material, commonly including topics such as (but not limited to), sexual assault, violence, pornographic material, hate speech, gore/death. (Importantly, they are an accessibility feature, and not a form of censorship.)

- **Revisionist history**

- When used as a criticism in everyday conversation, “revisionist history” refers to conscious, intentional misstatements about things in the past, whether distant or recent. [This is how we use it during our conversation about season 1, episode 3 of

*Unwell.*] However, it is worth noting that the term is used in many different ways.
