JENNY C. 01:18

JENNY C. 01:28

It's gonna be so fun.

JENN T. 01:30

Okay, we also have a guest.

JENNY C. 01:32

We have a guest!

JENN T. 01:33

I'm just gonna do like three words or so about this guest and let this guest... it sounds like I'm passing the buck and I'm being lazy. I'm not. I just think someone should, you know, have agency over their own bio. So here it is. This person is a cat person. This person is a podcast guru. This person loves dinosaurs. I'm so sorry. JENN T. 02:33

I had a crush on her when she was 10 years old. The only one on this podcast who was then there. There. In those theaters.

JENNY C. 02:40

You were there. But Steven, before we get to our main event, which is talking about The Legendary. Yes, I had bangs in 2004 because of her, Jenny Lewis. Steven, can you give us your little one minute elevator pitch for yourself?

JENN T. 03:49

Also a great tattoo.

Steven Ray Morris 03:51

Yeah, that's true. If any tattoo artists are working...

JENN T. 03:59

Yeah, we need a hotline actually, now that I said that out loud. That would be a fun thing to have. Um, okay, so yeah, we're talking about Jenny Lewis today

JENNY C. 04:06

And we do have to say, this is a Halloween episode because obviously we're living in a world of terror. But also because Steven, you dressed up as Jenny Lewis for Halloween.

Steven Ray Morris 04:19

This is very exciting, because this is the first time watching these movies in their entirety too as well and so it just felt like a real confluence of everything I love, Universal Studios. I was about to say Girl Scout cookies.

JENN T. 04:33

You can say that. I think we don't have to adhere to what the version of the Girl Scouts is when we get to this movie. Yeah, it'll be too much for our brains to handle. We'll just say Girl Scouts.

JENNY C. 04:45

And we do have a... what was your level of Girl Scout leadership, Jenn?

JENN T. 04:50

Well, I'm not ready for one of those surprises yet, but I am going to put my little vest on. I made it all the way to senior cadet. I got the second highest award, which is the silver award, because I said to my mother, I did it in eighth grade, I said "if you fucking make me stay in Girl Scouts high school, I will lose my mind" and you know back then the name of the game was get as many patches as possible to get into college, question mark? JENN T. 06:32

Maybe she'll like this as well. This ode to her!

JENNY C. 06:35

We're gonna re-call attention to it for sure.

JENN T. 06:40

With your permission, we'll probably put it up on the 'gram.

Steven Ray Morris 06:43

Oh my gosh. I love that costume. I love... in college, because I went to UC Santa Barbara they named the-

JENN T. 06:48

Wait you were a banana slug?

Steven Ray Morris 06:50

No no, that's Santa Cruz.

JENN T. 06:51

No, my bad. So sorry, that's my favorite mascot of any.

JENNY C. 06:52

It's really good.

Steven Ray Morris 06:57

Honestly considered going just for that.

Steven Ray Morris 06:59

Or because the Lost Boys was shot there.

Steven Ray Morris 07:01

That's true. Also another classic. But yeah, no I wanted to... I mean, it's one of the greatest records ever. I got to see her perform the full thing live in concert a few years ago. So, at the time it was like, I don't know, like it was funny to dress up as a specific album cover. I didn't have any Watson twins with me but maybe one day.

JENN T. 07:20

Oh I forgot... Words are coming, words were in my brain via friends, but I for what we... Okay, we'll get into the music, sorry.

JENNY C. 07:28

We'll get into it.

JENN T. 07:29

I thought we were just talking about our bangs. Okay, go.

JENNY C. 07:32

Well, we are. I was doing, basically, Jenny Lewis cosplay for about, oh, four years, so it's fine. But we want to talk about Jenny and her wonderful origin story. So I've prepared a bio, everyone. We're going to start with our sources, as we always do. Jen, can you guess my first source?

JENN T. 07:51

If it's not Wikipedia, I'm gonna walk off of this podcast.

JENNY C. 07:54

It's fucking Wikipedia. Um, also Jenny Lewis' Instagram, @JennyDianeLewis, an NME review by Elle Hunt from 2019, a 2019 interview with The Guardian by Michael Hahn, and a 2016 article by Jessica Roy for The Cut. Alright, so Jennifer Diane Lewis, which we haven't had a Jennifer Diane yet.

JENN T. 08:17

It's a great middle name.

JENNY C. 08:18

She was born January 8, 1976. I'd like to remind everyone my birthday is January 7.

JENN T. 08:25

As always, happy to hear when a lady is older than me. Happy to hear it.

JENNY C. 08:29

She was born in Las Vegas, Nevada. Her mother Linda was a professional singer.

JENN T. 08:35

Wait one minute, my mom's name is Linda. Just wanted to draw those... Uh oh, am I Jenny Lewis?

JENNY C. 08:41

Jenn, I have to tell you. There's actually a lot of parallels between your early life and Jenny Lewis' early life, so just start checking some boxes. Her father, Eddie Gordon, was a member of the harmonica gang, which Wikipedia states with no elaboration. They're like, we all know what that is. The harmonica gang! And her parents had their own Sonny and Cher tribute act together, which is cute.

JENN T. 09:05

Is this the part that's like my life?

JENNY C. 09:07

No, here's the part. Her dad left their family home when she was three years old. Yep. And her mom worked as a waitress and it was hard for the family to make ends meet until she was plucked out of her preschool by an acting agent. Which, who's letting acting agents into preschool?

JENN T. 09:25

It's always, I think we've made this reference before, when somebody's like, gross, their dad's gross friend, will be like, "has your daughter thought of acting? She's attractive." And I'm like... she's three. But okay.

JENNY C. 09:37

She's a very cute kid. She became a child star acting in TV commercials and shows and films. Her first television role was in a 1985 episode of The Twilight Zone, playing Sarah, in parentheses, ghost child.

Steven Ray Morris 09:51

A role we all want to strive to.

JENNY C. 09:54

I would love to play Sarah (ghost child).

JENN T. 09:57

We should find that episode. I actually own every, actually I think it's on Hulu. That's the original Twilight Zone. This was like the weird reboot, but we should try to find the epiosde, Jenny, and maybe talk about it like a spooky mini-sode.

JENNY C. 10:07

Yeah, this is '85, so. Then she had many guest starring roles on classic shows like The Golden Girls, Jenn's favorite.

JENN T. 10:14

I've seen that one. That was the episode where she got Rose's teddy bear. They accidentally gave her Rose's teddy bear during a rummage sale and Rose was like, no thanks, this is my bear, and she was like, bitch no it's not. And she was really sad. She was also dressed as some sort of Girl Scout in that episode as well. So apparently, she was typecast.

JENNY C. 10:32

She had a brand. She's also on Growing Pains, Baywatch and Murder She Wrote.

JENN T. 10:37

All of my favorite shows!

JENNY C. 10:42

Basically, in 1989, she played both Hannah Nefler in Troop Beverly Hills and Hayley Brooks in The Wizard, which we're going to talk about today. Both poorly received by critics, but adored by many today. She had a small role in 1998's Pleasantville, after which she left acting behind to start the band Rilo Kiley with friends Pierre de Reeder, Blake Sennett, and Dave Rock, who was replaced by Jason Boesel. Rilo Kiley, with Jenny on lead vocals, released four studio albums between 2001 and 2007, before disbanding in 2011. She also has a prolific solo career, releasing four studio albums between 2006 and 2019. Two with her former collaborator Johnathan Rice, and one with the group Nice As Fuck, and appearing famously on the Postal Service's first album.

JENN T. 11:36

This is a very specific era of music and clothing. I can see all of it.

JENNY C. 11:41

I was a freshman in college when all this was happening. It was my entire personality.

Steven Ray Morris 11:47

I mean, it's a good personality to imitate.

JENN T. 11:49

Yeah, there are definitely worse personalities out there for sure.

JENNY C. 11:55

Her fourth solo record came out in 2019, On the Line, features a guest appearance by a little known drummer named Ringo Starr, I don't know if you've heard of him? As she began promotion for her fourth album, she began to talk publicly for the first time about her upbringing, about how her mother Linda had been a heroin addict since early childhood.

JENN T. 12:17

Oh my mom too. There's another line. We don't like to brag, us Jenny's.

JENNY C. 12:22

She was estranged from her for about two decades. But they were united in 2017, as Linda was dying of liver cancer. She told The Guardian's Michael Hahn, "this has been my experience and maybe I do have a little experience, strength, and hope to share. That's the feeling I get out in the world. When I bump into people who have been listening to my songs for 10 or 15 years, there's a warmth and a love and an emotional rawness that I feel from women in particular. So it's scary to share this stuff, but it's true." Which, I just love that.

JENN T. 12:51

I recognize those words experienced. Oh, boy, do I... That's some 12 step-y.

JENNY C. 12:56

Oh boy do I as well. She's currently on tour opening for Harry Styles.

JENN T. 13:01

Never heard of that guy either! Who are these unknown artists she collabs with?

JENNY C. 13:07

Little known guy! So she's like playing in stadiums and kicking ass. She has amazing merch. When it was announced that she was going to be his opener, some of his fans were complaining that she wasn't famous enough to open for Harry Styles. So now like her projections on stage and her tour merch says "Who the fuck is Jenny Lewis?"

JENN T. 13:26

It's very good and very funny. Thay's the way you do it.

JENNY C. 13:30

And she's been kicking ass. She's able to introduce her music to lots of different people. She's also been considered a style icon for her 20 year music career, which I relate to intensely. I blame her and Zoey Deschanel for all of the bangs I had in the early 2000s. So in an article by Jessica Roy for The Cut series, "I like this bitch's life", she wrote, "Jenny was a manic pixie dream girl before being a manic pixie dream girl became passe or anti-feminist. For a particular brand of suburban girl who fancied herself cooler than her peers, Jenny was a fire haired figure of worship with her endless supply of cool sunglasses, vintage dresses, and hats. She was a beacon of hope for introspective teens. How was her hair so shiny and voluminous at the same time? How did her lyrics about depression and heartbreak and a state I'd only been to once speak to me so dearly? Boys had Holden Caulfield, Conor Oberst, probably some rando skateboarder with a cool t-shirt line. Girls had Jenny Lewis". So that's a little bit about our girl Jenny.

JENN T. 14:39

I do want to say, I don't think she's a natural redhead. Because in Troop Beverly Hills she's got sort of brownish hair, it's not quite red. And then suddenly in The Wizard, it's very red.

JENNY C. 14:50

I think it's red.

JENN T. 14:52

I don't know. I'm just saying. I'm just putting it out there. I remember, I was, while watching Troop Beverly Hills, I thought to myself, her hair's not really red here. It feels very brown to me.

JENNY C. 15:02

I don't know. Well, so we want to talk about some of Jenny's amazing film work.

JENN T. 15:11

If people don't know who she is as a singer, I guarantee it, everyone at the Harry Styles concert has no idea that she has been in any motion pictures. But she has. And The Wizard, even though Troop Beverly Hills came out first, we're going to talk about The Wizard. I'm going to zip through it really quick. I don't want to spend too much time talking about the making of it. And then we'll just talk about our emotional response to this film. When I texted Steven, I said you're gonna like The Wizard. There are dinosaurs in it. That's what I said!

Steven Ray Morris 15:41

No truly, it's like a kid's... Between Jenny Lewis living your childhood, I don't know if you had childhood acting dreams, but...

JENN T. 15:48

I thought you were gonna say, "I don't now if you had a childhood!" I'm like, I actually didn't.

Steven Ray Morris 15:52

There we go. That fantasy, and then yeah, this movie was like, I mean, it truly felt like adults being like, what would kids love the most?

JENN T. 16:01

It's crunchy. It's a crunchy movie. So here we go. A brief history of The Wizard. Our sources for today are "Why The Wizard Captured a Generation of Nintendo Fans" by Katie Baker for The Ringer, "The Wizard, the Power Glove, and Children in Peril" by Chris Higgins for Mental Floss, "The Making of The Wizard, The Greatest Nintendo Movie Ever (Honest)" by Damien McFerrin for Nintendolife.com. I've actually visited that website on numerous occasions. And of course, Roger Ebert's scathing review of The Wizard. I love it when adults have a lot to say about a kid's movie. So the movie was released on December 15, 1989. And I was there, I saw it in theaters. I was a big Nintendo baby. It was written by David Chisolm and directed by Todd Holland, both of whom just had done a couple of television shows. Although notably Todd Holland, and I'm really gonna age myself here, had done an episode of Max Headroom. Anybody? Max Headroom? Didn't think so. It was shot between Fred Savage's TV schedule, because at the time he was the biggest star in the movie. We got a Bridges in this movie, and we still got a savage being savage.

JENNY C. 17:16

I mean, he was like the biggest and also the tiniest little man in the 80s.

JENN T. 17:23

Yeah, he was barely taller than the young boy playing his little brother. Yeah, according to Tom Holland, the director, and I quote, "everywhere we went while shooting, everyone recognized him. People lined the streets in Reno, Nevada", as they do "as we drove in, and girls were screaming Fred's name and hooting and waving. Fred was 12 years old, he turned 13 while we were shooting and I will always be stunned by the grace with which he handled all of that attention". Okay, well this puberty-ridden child is totally into girls screaming his name. What a

shock. This motion picture has been described as a 90-minute Nintendo ad, and to be fair, it is. In fact, if you guys didn't see it in the credits, there was someone named Novak who was listed simply as Power Glove Consultant. As stated, it stars baby Fred Savage who was riding high on that Wonder Years fame, Christian Slater who had just done Heather's. What a term.

JENNY C. 18:22

I mean, that's like peak hotness for Christian Slater, that era.

JENN T. 18:27

I mean Pump Up The Volume, this was like Gleaming The Cube, which I think might have been even... I'm just so old right now. Can we get another 40 year old in this?

JENNY C. 18:35

We might need to. Maybewe should get a 50 year old Jennifer and then we can have true representation.

JENN T. 18:40

I went and got my hair trimmed the other day and I referenced Salt and Peppa, and the 25 year old went "I don't know what that is". So I was like, okay, just keep cutting my wrist. So obviously Jenny Lewis was fresh from Troop Beverly Hills, Luke Edwards, who played Jimmy, had been on a couple of episodes of like Roseanne and 21 Jump Street, and of course Beau Bridges, who is a Bridges. Just who he is. He's got a hot son who was naked and hot in Star Man. Um, now when they were trying to cast Jenny Lewis and they described this as Fred Savage's "love interest", which I find to be absolutely disgusting because these are preteens and I would argue there was no love there really. Universal wanted to cast a teenage Texas beauty queen type, but she couldn't act, apparently. And then the director was like, what if we had this really great actor and Universal was really gross and they were just like she's not cute enough, because they're gross. And then finally they landed on Jenny Lewis who I guess was cute enough for Universal. In case you didn't pick up on this, maybe you have, the movie was very loosely based on and inspired by Tommy, a musical that I have seen IRL.

Steven Ray Morris 18:41

Wait the Who musical?

JENN T. 19:58

Tommy, the Who's. Yeah, the Who's. I thought you said, "the who?". We're about to have an Abbott and Costello moment.

JENNY C. 20:05

I don't know about Tommy the musical. The Who made a musical? Why?

JENN T. 20:11

And then Roger Daltrey, I believe played Tommy in the film version of it right? Am I wrong? I might be wrong.

Steven Ray Morris 20:16

I've never seen the film version.

JENN T. 20:18

It's great. The music is great. Many people have also casually referred to this film as Rain Boy, because it was very reminiscent of Rain Man, about a man who takes his autistic brother to a tournament to get him to like win money. So it is very much a weird child version of those movies, where nobody really says autistic out loud and they're sort of not getting it right. Um, but more importantly for me, this movie was used as a vehicle to introduce Super Mario Brothers 3 to the United States of America. It had already been out in Japan for a full year, and when I tell you guys that I gasped in my little seat, when the doors opened, and I heard [intro music] I lost my fucking mind because I loved Super Mario Brothers so much. And I was like, what's happening right now? You know, you get overwhelmed easily when you're little or 41.

Steven Ray Morris 21:11

I mean, it's kind of incredible, actually. And it's funny because I feel like people criticize a lot of stuff now for doing things like that. But I mean, honestly, actually making a story around it is kind of fun. Like, rather than just like, here's a random thing, it feels like they actually took more care because I mean, they didn't have to craft a whole tournament around it. They could have just showed them playing the game.

JENN T. 21:35

And it was a very good tournament. Like, imagine playing... Like to have the three finalists play a game that no one had ever played before, thus leveling the playing field entirely. This is not a real thing, but I'm speaking about as if it was real, it was a very good idea.

JENNY C. 21:51

Yeah, cuz kids, you didn't have like YouTube previews of shows like or video games, you know, you wouldn't have known what the game looked like, so.

JENN T. 21:59

Or as I like to do, watch six hours of playthroughs of like a charter. I'm like, this is a movie, right? Yeah. Anyway.

Steven Ray Morris 22:06

I mean, it is one of the greatest games of all time, so I kind of feel like it's...

JENN T. 22:10

It really is. Okay, a couple more things and then we'll talk about it in depth. It was also how they were promoting the Power Glove the most. Now if anybody knows anything about the Nintendo Power Glove, and honestly, why would you? But I do. It was notoriously shitty. Like, to the point of like, you think about it now like, what do you watch? If you watch it, there's an old... you can Google it. There's like, you can find old ads on YouTube of them promoting the Power Glove,

and it basically looks like Wii. The first iteration of Wii. And it was, but it never worked. It was fucking garbage.

JENNY C. 22:48

I had never seen one until this movie, even. Like I remember the like Duck Hunt gun. And that was the only accessory I remember.

Steven Ray Morris 22:56

Yeah, it must have been really expensive, right?

JENN T. 22:58

It was very expensive. And also it wasn't made by Nintendo, it was actually made by Mattel in an effort to replace the NES controller. Which, why? Why can't it be a companion? Why does Mattel have to be so vicious? There's a great article on Medium called "Why Was the Nintendo Power Glove a Failure?" If anyone is like dying to just pause or revisit this. It's a pretty interesting tale of woe.

JENNY C. 23:22

That's a really leading headline. Why was it a failure?

JENN T. 23:27

I love to hear a sad story. Um, so this is what Roger Ebert had to say about the motion picture he gave one star to.

Steven Ray Morris 23:36

Whoa.

JENN T. 23:37

Yeah, one star. "Who was this movie intended for?"

JENNY C. 23:42

Not Roger!

JENN T. 23:44

"No one above the age of reason will be able to abide it. Of those below that age, the studio may have targeted kids who are Nintendo fans. But here, the problem is that the movie doesn't have much Nintendo in it. And some of that," listen to how much of a piece of shit he sounds right now, "and some of that is wrong. When it's announced, for example, that the third level of Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles has been reached. The movie screen clearly shows the first level". That's not a critique of a film.

Steven Ray Morris 24:13

That's very petty for Roger. That's very petty.

JENN T. 24:16

Ok shut the fuck up Roger, okay. Sorry, Roger. Anyway,

JENNY C. 24:19

Rest in peace, Roger, rest in peace.

JENN T. 24:21

Yeah, I hope you're playing the correct levels of Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles in heaven. "The Wizard is finally just a cynical exploitation film with a lot of commercial plugs in it and it is so insanely overwritten and ineptly directed that it will disappoint just about everybody and serve them right for going in the first place". He hated this movie! And finally, I want to end on a very sad note. In 2004, Jackie Vinson, the guy who played Lucas, the bad boy, the "it's so bad", that kid was charged and sentenced to 10 years probation for child molestation and is currently on New York sex offenders list. Yeah, like more like the power-less glove. So, bummer to him. Sorry.

JENNY C. 25:08

What a great way to end that story, Jenn.

JENN T. 25:11

I don't know, where do you put something like that? In the middle?

JENNY C. 25:16

I feel like movie reviewers sometimes just forget that a lot of movies are for children and children will watch anything. Anything.

JENN T. 25:25

Yeah, I also think that when you ask this question about a child's movie, the implication is that if it's not 100% goofy, then it can't be a kid's movie, and then if there's any sort of emotional, like, maturity inside of it, like you're just sort of suggesting that children can't have these emotional reactions. It's a very emotional movie, and I think what Roger Ebert might be suggesting is is like, "these kids wouldn't have these thoughts or feelings"... and like I don't know, it's a very traumatic movie with Nintendo.

Steven Ray Morris 25:59

I was just gonna say yeah, cuz I mean, I always loved to read IMDb trivia, and apparently there's a version of this movie that's an hour longer.

JENN T. 26:09

It's a two and a half hour movie that they cut down to, I think, 100 minutes. There's a lot.

JENNY C. 26:16

Was it more Nintendo or just more like...

Steven Ray Morris 26:18

It was more story stuff. It was more stuff with the family and alcohol... JENN T. 29:04

I love that movie.

Steven Ray Morris 29:06

I also almost watched Beverly Hills Cop, because of the name similarity. But I made sure to check, because I'm like wait, I don't think Jenny Lewis is in that movie.

JENN T. 29:14

You know what would have been appropriate is if you had both watched all of Beverly Hills 90210, because Jenny Garth is in that. So we could have happily had a different Jenny conversation while still sitting in Beverly Hills.

JENNY C. 29:26

Happy accidents, happy accidents.

JENN T. 29:28

I do want to point out that, there was a, I would argue, another star of this motion picture, and that is the New Kids on the Block, who show up not once musically, but at least twice, possibly three times.

JENNY C. 29:40

As they should.

JENN T. 29:41

The Right Stuff and Hanging Tough are both parts of the soundtrack, and at no point do we acknowledge that everywhere they stopped the New Kids on the Block are at every truckstop, they're just playing.

Steven Ray Morris 29:52

Sweeping the nation.

JENN T. 29:53

Yeah, and I also love that we're supposed to understand that from a Jimmy to two businessmen in a diner, like Nintendo arcade fever is just sweeping the nation in this motion picture. I don't remember the country, I guess... I don't know, I guess I did play like six hours a day, but...

Steven Ray Morris 30:12

It seems shady a little bit.

JENN T. 30:42

Even like at a mall? Like every mall had an arcade and you were just like, I'm gonna be here for six hours and then I'll meet you at the food court by the fountain after I'm out of quarters for more quarters.

JENNY C. 30:54

I definitely played some arcade games, but it was like, if we went to a pizza place that had a single arcade game and we were too bored to make conversation with adults, we would get some quarters to play.

JENN T. 31:05

And it was always PacMan.

JENNY C. 31:06

Yeah, Pac Man. Or like, even the golf one that's just like, you just like go like that.

JENN T. 31:14

Golden tee?

JENNY C. 31:15

Golden tee.

JENN T. 31:16

All my worst ex boyfriends played Golden Tee.

Steven Ray Morris 31:20

It just makes me think that Jenny Lewis, I feel like because she's talked more about her acting career in the last few years, and the She's Not Me video references both of these films.

JENN T. 31:29

Oh, really?

Steven Ray Morris 31:30

Yeah, there's like, Fred Armisen wears the power glove. They're all wearing Beverly Hills Troop outfits and stuff.

JENNY C. 31:37

Yeah, Vanessa Bayer is dressed as Shelley Long.

JENN T. 31:40

So, did you not get that reference then? And then you watched the movies and you're like, Oh my god, that's fun!

Steven Ray Morris 31:46

I knew it was a reference to it, but it is funny watching Beverly Hills Troop. It's like wow, it totally makes sense that Jenny Lewis would play Shelley Long's daughter, like it's such a perfect casting in that way. But I feel like you could maybe do a sequel to The Wizard and Jenny Lewis is an adult in like all the barcades in Los Angeles. Like as a thriller, you know? And maybe there's some other new, I don't know, maybe they reveal the new Fortnite or something like that.

JENN T. 32:14

This tournament is three weeks long. That is like, more conducive to a Fortnite versus a Super Mario Brothers 3.

JENNY C. 32:23

Enjoy the scenery! There's a lot to look at.

Steven Ray Morris 34:01

Stop and smell the flowers.

JENN T. 34:04

I will say that I did have like a flashback. So there's this scene. Should we talk really quick, the premise of the movie is that Fred Savage and Christian Slater are, and this kid Jimmy whose real name I think is Lucas something, I can't remember. I'm sorry. They're brothers, Fred Savage and Christian Slater. They live with their father, Beau Bridges, and Jimmy, who we think has undiagnosed probably autism or Asperger's we don't know is living with the mother. And he's about to be institutionalized because he can't stop wandering away. When we meet him, he is

They meet Jenny Lewis at a random truckstop, who's like this very sassy like, you know, "street smart" is what the kids would say.

JENNY C. 35:39

All these children wandering the country.

JENN T. 35:42

This is also a movie where adults yell at children all the time in various ways, and we haven't even gotten to the bounty hunter. And we will, but like, so then they discover that there is a video game tournament in California. So now they have like a larger purpose. They can win \$50,000, and that's the whole thing is them trying to get to this tournament. Along the way, they meet various individuals, it's sort of like a video game in and of itself. Steven Ray Morris 36:51

No no he completely burned down. Yeah, it's very tragic.

JENN T. 36:56

I was laughing at that... I've done that backlot tour, I went to, well I did it in Disney World, I can't remember if I've done it in Disneyland. In California, sorry, not Disneyworld. Florida versus California. Yeah, they're different parks, please don't come for me, don't doxx me.

JENNY C. 37:12

Please doxx her.

JENN T. 37:13

You know what? Do it. I love meeting new people. So, they have a version of King Kong on like a 3d ride, I just went in July to Disney World, so I have an update, and it's so funny to watch this incredibly realistic scenario and then to see that, I was just like, "God that's funny looking".

Steven Ray Morris 37:37

That King Kong ride is actually what inspired Steven Spielberg to do Jurassic Park a little bit. Or one of the kind of elements that was in the mix.

JENN T. 37:44

Really?

Steven Ray Morris 37:45

Yeah because I mean, you know, it;s all very cheeky now to see all that stuff, but you know, there's kind of a charm to it, I feel like. Than like 3D glasses and watching Vin Diesel ride on a helicopter?

JENN T. 37:57

I love that ride so much.

Steven Ray Morris 37:59

Where he's as big as the helicopter. It's so weird, CGI.

Steven Ray Morris 43:20

Yes. Oh my gosh, with his little mullet? He was so cute.

JENN T. 43:22

I was- he did not, didn't even utter a single line. But there he was.

Steven Ray Morris 43:26

He looked like he almost was he's like [Opens mouth to speak].

JENN T. 43:28

He was trying to get it out. He's, his face has not changed. It's also like that was like a nice easter egg just like Elijah Wood in "Back to the Future II."

Steven Ray Morris 44:17

Yeah "My Girl" yeah, let's have him in that,

JENN T. 44:18

I'm like, what is the one with Nick Cage?

JENNY C. 44:21

Oh! [Laughs]

Steven Ray Morris 44:22

"Raising Arizona." We'll have Vin Diesel as the baby in Raising Arizona." No, I don't know [LAUGHTER].

JENNY C. 44:28

You heard it here everybody.

Steven Ray Morris 44:30

He matured quickly.

JENN T. 44:31

JENN T. 48:33

I, I really-

Steven Ray Morris 48:33

Cuz this was the same year! Like that's what also when you recommended both I was like, oh, they're literally from the same year.

JENNY C. 48:38

Yeah. So you can really contextualize them as like, people were seeing them around the same time. So um, the poster's tagline, which first of all Shelley Long is smoking on the theatrical poster.
