Jamie Gray – 2000

Had Jamie Gray started her prep career at Bradford High School, there is no doubt she would have been Bradford's first twelve-sport varsity letter winner. She transferred to Bradford from St. Joe's, where she had been selected to the WISSA All-State Tournament basketball Team as a freshman. At Bradford, she became one of Bradford's most outstanding female athletes of all-time.

Basketball is where Gray's talents reached record setting heights. For example: Jamie became Bradford's all time leader in points, rebounds, and steals; she finished second in assists and blocked shots; and, as a senior, she averaged just over 20 points per game, while shooting 46 percent from the floor. With those kinds of numbers, it is no surprise that Jamie was selected to three State teams, in addition to being named Co-Player of the Year for the Southeast Conference, 3-time All-County player, 3-time All-Conference, Bradford's MVP 3 times, and captain of the team for two seasons.

Jamie also dominated on the volleyball court. During the three years she was on the Bradford team, she led the team in kills, aces, blocks, and service attempts. She was a 3-time All-County and All-Conference selection, in addition to being the team's MVP three times, and Captain for two seasons.

Jamie's career went beyond the field house. On the soccer field she earned All-Conference honors and was named the team's MVP.

Jamie graduated from Bradford in the top 15% of her class, and received the 2000 Scholar Athlete Award, in addition to the Glen McCulloch Scholarship.

After high school, Gray attended the University of Evansville, where she had received a full Division One basketball scholarship. During her junior and senior years she was the most valuable athlete and first-time all conference. She set a Missouri Valley Conference record during her senior year when she scored 33 points during one game. She was named the Missouri Valley Conference player of the week five times, and was an All-American candidate.
