Your Family, Your Plan: A Guide to Emergency Preparedness

If your loved one is at risk of being arrested by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), it's crucial to act promptly and methodically. Here's a checklist to guide you through the necessary steps, before and after an ICE arrest:

Plan Ahead, Before There's An Arrest

Gather your	personal documents,	store them	in a safe	place.

- o Driver's License and/or Identification Card
- Birth Certificate
- Passport
- Social Security/ITIN
- Marriage License and/or Divorce Papers (if applicable)
- Arrest and Conviction History Records (if applicable)
- Income Tax Returns
- Pay Stubs
- Caregiver's Authorization Affidavit or Power of Attorney Letter
- Letters of Support from Community Members

Identify emergency contacts and share them with your family. Know your "A-Number," share it with your emergency contacts. Choose an emergency caregiver for your children and family. Sign a "Caregiver Authorization Affidavit" or assign a "Power of Attorney." Place your emergency caregiver on your children's school/daycare pick-up list.
Prepare a list of medications for your designated caregiver . Include the medication name(s), dosage(s), schedule(s), and any specific instructions(s).
