MINUTES FOR POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY MEETING (PRMM) FOR BUSINESS FOR DECEMBER 19, 2021

Meeting began at 11:45 with some silence. Present were: Christopher Sammond, Howard Nelson, Hannah Richter, Sigrid Mortensen, A.T. Miller, Craig Kukuk, Sally Otis, Dill Otis, Paul Simkin, Jane Simkin, Suzanne O'Hara, Andy Simkin, Larry Buffam, Rebecca Schillenback.

- 1. Christopher Sammond read the following statement from Elizabeth Meyer's Pendle Hill pamphlet A Practical Mysticism: "Quaker business process is a group practical mysticism that opens the worshiping body to the promptings of the Divine." He invited Friends to use the same discernment as in our unprogrammed worship when deciding whether or not to speak.
- 2. Minutes from the November Meeting for Business were read.
- 3. Treasurer Report: Sigrid Mortensen reported:

"Poplar Ridge Friends Meeting contributions, year-to-date, total \$31,747, which is 65% of our 2021 budget. For comparison, in December of 2020, we had received contributions totalling 83% of our budget, and in December of 2019, we had received contributions totalling 98% of that year's budget.

"We are 96% of the way through 2021, and we have spent 91% of our budget. We have spent\$44,537 and have \$4,369 remaining in the budget to spend.

"We need \$17,159 more contributed in 2021 to meet our \$48,906 2021 budget, or a minimum of \$12,790 to meet our spending-to-date.

"Put another way, with only 4% of the year remaining, we still need enough contributions to meet 35% of our budget, or 29% of our spending."

Sigrid was thanked for her work as treasurer.

4. Finance Committee Report: Preliminary copies of the proposed 2022 budget were circulated. Andy Simkin said that this version has incorporated consultation with the various committees. He noted a 10% increase in the Pastoral Care contract and worship leader honorariums, to address inflation and cost of living increases. These are the first increases in these budget lines in two years. Sigrid Mortensen noted the need to address NYYM's annual request. Andy said that we should follow previous practice, with final approval of the budget coming in January, when the current year has concluded. Thanks were expressed to the Finance Committee for their work. and in particular the annual appeal letter that has recently been sent out.



5. Ministry & Counsel Committee: Hannah Richter reported: **M&C is working on filling the worship leader schedule during Rebecca's sabbatical. Volunteers are requested. Music and queries will provide the format at times. **Hannah noted that M&C has conducted its annual reviews with Craig Kukuk and A.T. Miller about their roles as Pastoral Care and worship leader carrying on into the future, as they are facing some uncertainty in their plans. Craig anticipates retiring from the Pastoral Care position in the late spring/early summer. The cost of living increases (see #4) were recommended. Those who perform the Shepherd's Play express gratitude for being able to enact the play in the meeting house, even in a year when public performance is not

possible. **There was some discussion of use of the term "honorarium," clarifying that it indicates payment for services rendered.

6. At the request of the meeting, Clerk Christopher Sammond and Asst. Clerk Claire Howard met to bring forward a name for appointment to the Nominating Committee, in addition to current members Larry Buffam and Joanne Brum. It was proposed that Andy Simkin be added as the third member. His appointment was approved.



7. The topic of making a response to NYYM's proposed minute on becoming an anti-racist community was taken up. Peace & Social Action has discussed the statement. Larry Buffam shared some of the responses given in the committee:

--very long statement and very critical of Friends

--very critical but a necessary accepting of responsibility

--the tone is quite negative and excessively self-critical

--Quakers are best at looking for the good in everyone and building on that, for example, working with people who have committed murders and other heinous crimes through AVP and prison worship

--this feels like calling out people as racists, perhaps a better way is to acknowledge that people do racist things at times --racism is a big problem in our world and none of us is completely free of it

--the specific examples given of slavery, migrant labor and Native American boarding schools are totally unnuanced and should be left out of such a short statement --we believe this statement should conclude

--we believe this statement should conclude with a list of goals that NYYM Quakers can commit to acting towards

Larry began the discussion with a statement he has prepared, attempting to express the committee's reactions and reflections:

"We are mindful that persons of color have had different experiences in Quaker communities as well as the broader world. We are committed to listening to their experiences with our full attention. We are committed to unlearning some of the assumptions we have been raised with where they have led us into stereotyping others. We are committed to working for equal rights to health care, housing, education, clean water and justice for all people. We realize that our country is sadly very lacking in all these areas today. "We believe that our understanding of continuing revelation encourages us to be ready to change to keep up with the demands of a changing world. We are ready to change. We believe that our faith that there is that of God in everyone supports us in this journey."

Christopher Sammond suggested we send the list of comments from P&SA and Larry's statement to NYYM as a preliminary response to the proposed minute, while the minute itself is circulated again for our contemplation and future response. The question was asked, "What is the goal of NYYM's statement?" Christopher explained that NYYM seeks guidance from individual meetings before issuing any statement on an issue of great import intended to represent the Yearly Meeting as a whole. Larry will check with members of P&SA before sending the documents to NYYM. Both the NYYM

proposed minute and the P&SA response will be sent to the meeting's mailing list as an email, rather than putting them in Prism. These actions were approved.

- 8. The topic of singing in meeting was taken up, as we are doing on a monthly basis while the pandemic continues. It was noted that the pandemic has again become more severe. It was proposed that we continue with current singing practice, outlined in the November minutes, for the next month.
- 9. The topic of the print of Andrew Wyeth's "The Quaker" was taken up. Some were in favor of accepting and displaying, but it was also noted that there have been some negative reactions about having it displayed. It was clarified that the print would not be hung in the main meeting room. It was decided to accept the print, with the decision about hanging to be made by the Social Committee. Christopher Sammond noted that some friends relayed their lack of interest in the print but were not present at business meeting to labor with us.
- 10. Christopher Sammond noted that he will be distributing a list of suggested queries from NYYM, preparatory to undertaking the annual State of Society report.

Meeting closed at 1:37 with some silence.

Every Tuesday morning at 10:30 a group of Kendal residents join in worship. Jeffrey and I rearrange the tables against the wall and form a circle of chairs in a small conference room.

Prison worship and women's spiritual nurture group have both been wonderful gifts to me. I wanted to share this gift with my fellow residents at Kendal. I must admit I was also longing for this kind of worship since the pandemic had shut down the other groups. We begin with the check-in in which each person tells a little of what was going on in the past week that affected their spiritual condition. We then have a reading from Quaker literature followed by about 20 minutes of silent worship. After worship we have a discussion of either the reading or

whatever rises. Members occasionally speak from the silence.

Since we began in October and have continued every week, our little group has been growing slowly. We now number about 10. It is with great joy that I am able to introduce this wonderful quaker practice to others.


