Emeritus Albert Thévenot.
Truly a dark day; a reminder that
not everything is peaches and
cream. This combined with
some of the international
policies of our neighbour to the
south, indicates that Good Friday
has prevailed—and evil has

triumphed over good. But at the same time, we had record numbers at our Palm Sunday, Easter and Confirmation celebrations—which is an indication that good has prevailed. ## Faith Based Health Care Directive

Dying used to be simplier. You grew old in the home you lived in all your life, and when your body wore out, you passed into eternity. Today with all the medical technology, you can be kept alive indefinitely. In some ways this is a good thing. In some cases this is merely prolonging the inevitable. How can you be sure that your wishes are respected when your time comes? The answer is a Faith Based Health Care Directive, often called a living will. It will address the questions concerning your medical treatment in certain situations; such as being resuscitated...when you are still relatively young, or not being resuscitated when your body says, "It is time to die. The Catholic Health Association of Saskatchewan has an excellent resource at www. chassk.ca/publications/ Simply go to that page, scroll down, and download or print the file. 1) Be sure to fill it out, 2) Discuss your wishes with your family, 3) Appoint a proxy, as the time may come when you are no longer capable of making decisions, 4) And leave a copy of your Advanced Health Care Directive with your Proxy, Family and Doctor. In this way your wishes will be respected until your natural death.

#### **Vocations to the Priesthood**

I would like you to consider something. Every Sunday you come to St. Joseph to celebrate your faith; to become one with our God. When you get married, you come to the church, because you want God to bless your marriage and be a part of your family. When your child, or grandchild, is born, you want it to belong to the family of God, so you have him/her baptized. When the time comes for you to pass from this world to the next, you want a celebration in the church, because your relationship with God does not end with your death. Who makes all these possible...the parish priest. I can tell you that parish priests do this because they believe it is their vocation, their call from God. And most of the parish priests thoroughly enjoy their vocation. But...there is a but...priests are becoming a rare commodity. Consider the reality that in the last 40 years, only 12 priests have come from our diocese, and of these 12 only 7 are still with us...and in the next 6 years there will be at least 7 of our priests retiring, and only Dale is in the pipeline. St. Joseph has always had a parish priest, but that may not always be the case. We, as a parish family, need to get serious and start encouraging our sons and grandsons to become priests, and our daughters and granddaughters to become sisters. Only when we

have an environment of vocations in our church, will young men and women start considering a religious vocation. I remember once reading, "Your priest was once someone's son, perhaps your son will one day be someone's priest." I can tell you that my mom was in no way less proud of me than she was of her other children. Let us all pray that many of St. Joseph Parish's children will become priests and sisters

## An Article on Permanent Diaconate

The title "deacon" comes from the Greek word diakonos, which means "servant." Though all Christians by baptism are called to diakonia, or service, deacons serve as a public sacramental sign of Christ in and at the service of the world. Like a priest, a deacon is a member of the clergy who shares in the ministry of the Bishop. Unlike a priest, he may have a wife, a family, and a secular job. The diaconate is a distinct vocation, or calling, to imitate Christ in his service to all humanity, to bring the world to Christ and Christ to the world. This fall we will see another "crop" of candidates prepare to become Permanent Deacons. It is wonderful to see this once vanishing ministry in the Church flourish once again. Please pray for this new "crop" of Permanent Deacons, and please pray that many young people would respond to the call to become Priests, Deacons and Sisters.

I am left wondering, "After coming to the church for 20 or 30 years why don't they just become Catholic." If your spouse has been coming for 20 or 30 years and would like to be fully initiated into the Catholic Church, talk to them, and talk to Fr. Jim. # A Note from Amoris Laetitia: The Joy of Love,

This is one of Pope Francis' encyclicals, and it is a theme which runs through the recent final document on the Synod of the Church. "The Church wishes, with humility and compassion, to reach out to families and "to help each family to discover the best way to overcome any obstacles it encounters". It is not enough to show generic concern for the family in pastoral planning. Enabling families to take up their role as active agents of the family apostolate calls for "an effort at evangelization." "This effort calls for missionary conversion by everyone in the Church, that is, one that is not content to proclaim a merely theoretical message without connection to people's real problems". #### Remembering your St. Joseph in your Will

Planned Giving is when people plan very large donations to their parish. Normally people do not think of a planned gift until late in life. I am asking you to think about what kind of legacy you can leave to St. Joseph. Presently there are over 1300 families on our parish roster. If only 25% of those bequeathed 10% of their estate, or even \$10,000 of their estate to

the parish, we would have 400 X \$10,000 = \$4,000,000 (or more) which we could invest, and never have to worry about money again. I would ask that you talk over options with your family and your accountant, and see what is the best way to leave a legacy.

# **Direct Deposit**

Some Parishioners have been asking for the option of Direct Depositing their weekly collection. This can be a convenient way of donating to the parish, as the weekly task of finding a bill to put into the envelope is done away with, and the parish is left with a steady supply of income. If you are interested in direct deposit, please contact Helen at the parish office (306) 764-4942 and she will set you up. It has also been noted by some, that if you are using the direct deposit method of donating, others may never see you put anything in the collection basket. We are suggesting that you take the envelope from your box, write DD (for direct deposit) on it and drop the empty envelope into the collection basket.

## **Advantages to using Envelopes**

Every year we, as a parish, order a few extra boxes of envelopes. They help parishioners keep track of their donations, and it enables them to get an Income Tax Receipt; which in turn gives them a deduction on their Income Tax. Every year we encourage people to use these envelopes, and every year I am left asking, "If it is beneficial, why doesn't everyone use them?" I don't know the answer to that, but if you would like to start using envelopes, please contact

our parish secretary.

#### **Elevator Fundraising**

We started our Elevator Fundraising back in September. The reason is the Elevator is almost 40 years old and parts are no longer available, we have had reliability issue and we have to get it retrofitted. Prior to the Bishop Annual Appeal we raised about \$50,000. We put the campaign on hiatus while the Bishop's Appeal campaign was in action, and during the Christmas season, but now we are back into the elevator campaign. The raffle brought in a few thousand, the sale on May 10 brought in a few thousand, and money has still been coming in. Presently we are sitting at over \$60,000. The total bill will be \$120.000. If you have not yet contributed to this fund there will be ample time in the New Year.

# To Park or not to Park - That is the question

When people arrive late for Mass they are often looking for a place to park. Some are taking the open spots immediately opposite the church. Unfortunately these are the driveways of our neighbours. Please do not upset our neighbours because they are gracious enough to watch over our building at night. Vehicles will be towed if they block those driveways and you will be left holding the bill. Rather than giving that amount to a towing company, please donate it to the Elevator Fund.

## To Sit or not to Sit – That is the question

Everyone knows that every good Catholic sits at the back of the Church. However, the back of the church has been getting further and further back. People are coming in and immediately sitting in the foyer. This is unfortunate because that action is eliminating the space that is needed for parents with young children. If you do not have young children, please leave the spaces in the foyer for the young families. Thank you for your cooperation.

# **Death and New Hope**

Easter is normally a time of resurrection and joy. However, in our church we have experienced the deaths of significant death. First was Bishop Emeritus Albert Thévenot, who served as our bishop for almost 13 year; passed away April 13, Palm Sunday. The second significant death in our church was Pope Francis. He was elected on March 13, 2013 and died on April 21, the day after Easter. To most believers, he will be remembered as a pastorally sensitive leader who sought to re-connect the church with the essentials of the Christian faith. Francis followed his namesake, St. Francis of Assisi,

renowned for poverty, peace, and care of creation. It is appropriate that these two great men both dies around Easter. However, with these deaths comes new hope. Our Church has elected a new pope—Pope \_\_\_\_\_\_, (this was written before his election) let us pray that God will give him all the strength, wisdom and gifts to lead us into the future.

#### **Note on the Synod**

From October 2021 to October 2024, the Universal Church undertook a synod on Synodality. The purpose of a synod is to listen to the people of God to uncover what the Holy Spirit is saying to the Church at a particular time in history. This Synod asked us to consider how we are journeying together as the Church in communion, participation, and mission. After the final listening session in Rome in October of 2024, a report was generated, though the final document was not the primary intent of the process. Instead, the gift of the Synod on Synodality was to learn how synodality works through our journey, which the process created.

As the final document points out, our synodal journey has just begun. From our baptism, we are called as members of Christ's body to be missionary disciples. Disciples are those who follow Christ. Missionaries are those who are sent, and we are sent every week at the end of Mass. We are to use the skills taught through the synodal process, the skills of respectful dialogue and discernment through the Holy Spirit, to live our mission to share the Good News of Jesus Christ with everyone. We are called to do this as community believers, fully participating in the mission. And as we do this, we will live the refrain from the song "Sing a New Church" invites: "Let us bring the gifts that differ and, in splendid, varied ways, sing a new Church into being, one in faith and love and praise."
