



Role Description: Advocacy Ambassador

United to Beat Malaria's Advocacy Ambassadors are the "in-state" wing of our national grassroots advocacy strategy. They are responsible for taking regular advocacy actions and mobilizing grassroots supporters in their communities to take action for the campaign. United to Beat Malaria is looking for individuals committed to advocating for equity within the global health space. By advocating for malaria, participants will gain greater insight into the operations and impact of the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria; The President's Malaria Initiative. Students will learn how investments in these programs impact global health systems strengthening, as well as global health security. Additionally, participants will gain greater insight into the cross-sectional relationship between malaria and the military, in-country economic development, climate change, environmental health, and more.

Participants will prepare to utilize this knowledge as they engage Members of Congress during key moments throughout the year. Students with interests in policy, government, global health, vector-borne diseases, and climate change are encouraged to join this global effort alongside the United Nations Foundation, Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria; The President's Malaria Initiative.

Program Expectations/Responsibilities

- Advocacy Ambassadors will participate in our Fall virtual Advocacy Day in September (September 5th through 19th, depending on your state)
- Advocacy Ambassadors will be tasked with engaging in one advocacy action per semester (or two per year). Eligible actions include:
 - Organizing an In-District Meeting with a Member of Congress
 - Publishing an op-ed or Letter to the Editor on the importance of U.S. leadership in the fight against malaria
 - Giving a presentation about the campaign in class or to a student organization to collect petitions and Champion sign-ups
 - Tabling on campus to collect petitions and Champion sign-ups
 - Making phone calls to each of your Members of Congress (3 calls total)
 - We are open to your creative ideas for your advocacy projects as long as they support the mission and objectives of our grassroots campaign
- Advocacy Ambassadors will be responsible for working with United to Beat Malaria staff to plan their semesterly action and tracking their actions using our [Self-Tracking Action Report](#) (STAR)
- Advocacy Ambassadors will receive priority consideration if they choose to apply for our annual Leadership Summit in March

Program Components/Resources

- United to Beat Malaria will schedule group meetings (roughly twice per semester) based on group's availability for Ambassadors to connect and share updates on their projects
- Advocacy Ambassadors are invited to attend our bi-monthly Monday advocacy webinars. These training opportunities are aimed at resourcing advocates to round out their knowledge and expertise on the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria; The President's Malaria Initiative, the congressional appropriations process, as well the cross-sectional relationship



between malaria and the military, in-country economic development, climate change, and range of health-related topics. The chart below provides a brief overview of engagement opportunities.

United to Beat Malaria, a global grassroots campaign of the United Nations Foundation, brings together strategic and diverse partners and supporters to take urgent action to end malaria and create a healthier, more equitable world. Advocacy Impact

United to Beat Malaria grassroots advocates raise their voices in support of strong U.S. leadership and robust funding for the UN, the US President's Malaria Initiative (PMI), and the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, TB and Malaria. Thanks to persistent year-round advocacy, Congress approved funding increases for The Global Fund and PMI in its FY23 spending package. Strong investments in these programs will not only save millions of lives, but will also bolster economies, empower youth, and strengthen health systems throughout the malaria-affected world.

Advocacy

Although much progress has been made in pushing back against malaria, persistent advocacy in support of life-saving malaria programs continues to be a priority.

Grassroots support for The Global Fund and PMI reminds Members of Congress of the importance of U.S. leadership in the global health space. Additionally, investments in these programs contribute to building more stable economies and resilient workforces. Malaria investments allow governments to bolster their networks of community health workers to screen for multiple diseases, improve disease surveillance, and direct additional resources to health systems that can fight malaria and disease with epidemic and pandemic potential.

The support of grassroots advocates is key to sharing this progress and helping to secure a malaria-free future. By participating in key advocacy moments throughout the year, grassroots advocates join the collaborative global effort in support of these key life-saving programs.
