Course Name: **Latin 2 Academic**

Full Year, 1 Credit

Level: Academic

Grades 10-12. Prerequisite: Teacher Recommendation.

Continuing into Unit 2 of the *Cambridge Latin Course*, students cultivate a mastery of all fundamental Latin sentence structures, except for those found in subordinate clauses of complex sentences. In readings, research, and class discussion, students acquire a more nuanced understanding of the impacts that culture, language, history, and storytelling all have on shaping human experience, both in antiquity and the modern era.
