This sentence is the best choice because it clearly described Powell's inability to even the simplest tasks on his own. Leading an expedition would be physically demanding. Unfortunately, his injury diminished his ability to lead an expedition, which is all the more testimony to his strength for the fact that he did lead the expedition successfully.
