Keynote Address: 9:30-10:30 Hampton/Newport News Rooms

Dr. Lynn Z. Bloom, University of Connecticut

Lynn Z. Bloom is Board of Trustees Distinguished Professor and Aetna Chair of Writing at the University of Connecticut, where she has taught rhetoric and composition studies research, autobiography, creative nonfiction, and women writers courses since 1988. She is the recipient of the 1999 UConn Alumni Association Award for Distinguished Research, and research awards from the National Endowment for the Humanities, National Council of Teachers of English, and the US Department of Agriculture. "(Im)Patient" was named a Notable Essay of 2006. She has previously taught at Butler University, directed writing programs at the University of New Mexico and the College of William and Mary, and served as department head at Virginia Commonwealth University. She has served as President of the national Council of Writing Program Administrators, 1988-90, and chaired the Division of Teaching Writing and the Division of Prose Writing of the Modern Language Association.



ADDRESS: "Hot Genres: Nonfiction That People Love to Read, Write, and Teach"

Brian Doyle says that "The Greatest Nature Essay *Ever*" "would begin with an image so startling and lovely and wondrous that you would . . . read straight through the piece, marveling that you had indeed seen or smelled or heard exactly that, but never quite articulated it that way. . . ." Five paragraphs (yes!) later he concludes, "Oddly, sweetly, the essay just ends with a feeling eerily like a warm hand brushed against your cheek, and you sit there, near tears, smiling, and then you stand up. Changed."

All the writings in hot genres work the way the greatest nature essay does. Hot genres are informal essays, creative nonfiction focusing on topics at "the deep heart's core," what matters most in human relationships, nature, the world. This talk will discuss four of the hottest genres that are the most fun and challenging to read, write, and teach: personal essays, concerned with families and other meaningful relationships; and food writings, travel writings, and science and nature writings. These genres allow us to be fully human, providing space and time to think, feel, contemplate, without the pressure to rush to closure; they let us play—with subject, form, length. They demand originality, they are plagiarism-proof. And they are democratic—anyone can write them, as evidenced by the semi-finalists in NCTE's Norman

Mailer Creative Nonfiction contest. If you think this talk is an unabashed attempt to restore the essay to its rightful place in the composition curriculum, you're right. "Stand up. Changed."
