ABSTRACT

The abstract is presented concisely and factually. Abstract writing is expected to be 150 - 300 words. The abstract contains the background of the story, the scope of the review, important findings, conclusions, and recommendations/perspectives briefly. Avoid using references to abstracts. (Times New Roman, 10pt, italic, line spacing 1)

Keywords: word; word; word; word; word (consists of 3-5 keywords separated by semicolons)

INTRODUCTION (Times New Roman, 12pt, center, bold)

The introduction must convey sequentially the background of the research review and scientific studies that support the background of the research review. In addition, in the introduction it is necessary to explain explicitly the scope of this review article.

Example of writing a citation

1. One author: author's name and year of publication. Examples: Smith (2005) or (Smith, 2005);
2. Two authors: both author's name and year of publication. Examples: Smith and Jones (2005) or (Smith & Jones, 2005);
3. Three or more authors: the name of the primary author followed by 'et al.' and the year of publication. Example: Smith et al. (2005) or (Smith et al., 2005).

The conclusion is presented briefly and clearly. Conclusions are written in the form of whole paragraphs, not in the form of bullet points. In this section, it is also necessary to convey recommendations or perspectives from the author related to future research based on the findings in this review.

Each manuscript contains a minimum of 10 reference libraries that are primary sources. The library is written alphabetically with the provision of line spacing 1, before 0, after 6pt, hanging indent 0.85cm.
