- 12-month services or Extended School Year for students with IEPs are legal mandates. Busing done poorly undermines their civil rights to appropriate education.
- Bus contract terms defined in 1979 do not reflect the 2025 reality that New York City experiences tropical temperatures, high heat and air quality indices and flash flooding which not every yellow bus can withstand.
- Expanded special and early childhood education now includes more riders with small bodies / medical conditions / prescriptions that make safe body temperature a must
- Riders and workers alike suffer from the fact that nothing in the contracts stops companies from putting on the road C class vehicles that lack dual air control
- The penalty for failing to provide requisite climate control is \$400 per K-12 route but only \$85 per pre-K route, with a two-week period to appeal for dismissing the penalty (section 5.10 of bus contracts cited in 2018 investigation https://nycsci.org/wp-content/uploads/2018/Reports/12-19-Hot-School-Buses-Report.pdf)
- None of the 2019 student transportation Local Laws require a report on the number of buses with air conditioning capabilities; July and August were removed from the reporting period after the 2019-2020 school year.

• Currently, summer routes will not pick up students past 3:00 p.m. Thus the "Summer Rising" enrichment hours and full day field trips are only available for students whose families can arrange other means of transportation than the yellow bus.

Going forward

My family and school are counting on you to uphold the resolution which this panel passed by unanimous consent on June 18, 2025. It noted that incomplete specifications and out-of-date standards in the contracts are part of the school bus crisis. We agree with the goals promised that night, which we would summarize as:

- 1. **Support state Employee Protection Provision legislation** so that school bus contracts can be re-bid with hiring that prioritizes experience and not provoke another strike, lawsuit, massive layoffs or exponential attrition in this essential workforce; and
- 2. Refuse any more five-year emergency extensions of recycled contracts; i.e. Limit the next contract extension to no more than a year, and use all of that time to (a) inform Albany that our City favors EPP legislation and (b) seek and incorporate priorities for the contract specifications from students, families, educators, advocates and school bus staff, that is, those who have to deal with the day to day results of said contracts.
