## Middle School Virtual Learning Plan June 3-7

The following learning experiences are designed to enrich what we've learned this session, but are not for Badge credit. Enjoy!

**Squads:** Schedule a time this week to **present your AAR** to your Dream Team! Make sure that you have shared access with them to your completed AAR spreadsheet, and have your Dream Team complete the survey.

**<u>Quest</u>**: After having participated in fun Improv games this session, it's time to create your own Improv game!

- Research: Begin by exploring different types of improv games or reflect on games we've played Watch videos, read articles to understand the mechanics and objectives of improv activities.
- 2. **Brainstorm:** Now, brainstorm ideas for your improv game. Consider the following elements:
  - Name of the Game: Create a catchy and descriptive title.
  - **Number of Players:** Decide how many players your game will support.
  - **Materials Needed:** List any props or materials required to play the game.
  - **Gameplay Mechanics:** Describe the rules and flow of the game. How does one win or progress in the game?
  - **Objective:** What is the goal of the game? Is it to make people laugh, think creatively, or work as a team?
- 3. **Design:** Draft a clear set of instructions for your game. Ensure they are easy to understand and follow.
- 4. **Test:** Playtest your game with a friend or family member. Make adjustments based on feedback and observations.
- 5. **Reflection:** After playing the game, reflect on the design process. What worked well? What challenges did you face? How could the game be improved?
