		 Frevent referral data in update is from 2019/20 a these were the only complete annual figures provided by SO15 Prevent aims: challenging individuals who express extreme ideology, supporting those at risk of being drawn into terrorism and working with sectors and industries where there are risks of radicalisation Home Office has recognised hackney as a priority area. For this financial year we secured £209,686 which funded 3 officer posts and commissioned a number of projects which were delivered locally examples of prevent activities - working in partnership with comms, 	

- working with police information manager following cyber attack and measures have been put in place to ensure data safety
- deliver training selected by communities,
- community engagement meeting used to showcase projects on offer which focus on building community cohesion
- training on gang violence, far right radicalisation and community champions
- Hackney channel panel
- Prevent referrals over the reporting period there were 26 referrals. During COVID only 7 referrals
- types of referrals young people expressing an interest in school massacre, conflicted ideology (no specific ideology attributed to a political group), increase in Hackney around right wing extremism, islamist extremism still the most important ideology of concern
- Hackney biggest sector for referrals is education through dedicated education lead
- Risks for cluster COVID 19 and its impact on referrals, islamist extremism, mental health and mixed ideology, right wing extremism, hate crime and the online space
- Community engagement community engagement lead officer appointed to, has been positive in promoting prevent agenda across the partnership.
- Introduced a prevent round table, with community deciding agenda focus. meetings held monthly.
- Successes: team supported faith leads with ceremonial burial arrangements during covid, supporting vulnerable individuals, made links with Turkish organisations who can support prevent delivery, produced monthly community newsletters being shared to 220 community contacts and 104 educational settings, successfully run 12 channel panel meetings which have been well attended, 3 FOI requests, 320 participants attended training workshops
- new prevent education officer starting at the end of october

Home Office has requested all local areas to submit a proposal about why Prevent should be funded in their area. Tracey requested support from this meeting to ensure that this happens.

5.	2.55pm (15 minutes)	Role of group: For information and discussion of opportunities for joint working Papers: CHSAB Annual Report 2020/21 Key points: • slight challenge in terms of providing data for the report but the pattern of response in hackney reflected what was seen nationally - in each lockdown a reduction in reporting adult safeguarding issues but as lockdown eased this increased • areas like self-neglect, financial abuse and neglect were the areas most frequently reported • health sector continued to be major referer but also increase in referrals from the police • strategic work - met our statutory responsibilities, able to respond to issues arising, produced an information leaflet in september about newly emerging issues through covid • two adult safeguarding reviews undertaken which were published last year, provided a huge amount of information and insight on areas of improvement which have been addressed almost immediately • safeguarding adult week held in november 2020 • areas we haven't been able to progress - community engagement, recruiting lay members, postpone plans to look at case file audits Transitional Safeguarding action plan update / Transitional Safeguarding Knowledge briefing - Bridging the Gap	Dr Adi Cooper
		Context: This second action plan has been developed following the completion of the transitional safeguarding action plan of August 2021. The renewed action plan brings together recommendations and suggestions from service users, services that work with young people and members of the transitional safeguarding sub-group.	

This Transitional Safeguarding knowledge briefing has been co-produced with the Chief Social Worker for Adults, Research in Practice, the Association of Directors of Adult Social Services (ADASS), British Association of Social Workers (BASW), Care and Health Improvement Programme (Local Government Association and ADASS) and the NWG Network, with input from police colleagues. It draws on evidence from research and knowledge from local areas in order to describe what Transitional Safeguarding is, why it is needed and how the contribution of adult social work is key to developing and embedding a more transitional approach to safeguarding young people into adulthood.

Community Resilience Partnership update Cllr 6. 3.10pm (10 minute) Fajana-Thomas **Context:** This item presents an update on the most recent Community Resilience Partnership meeting which took place on Thursday 16 September. This meeting focused on poverty from the systems thinking approach, which recognises that poverty reduction and building resilience will require us to think and lead as a system- not from a service or individual perspective, to view the needs of individuals and families holistically and work collaboratively to achieve change. We heard directly from two young residents about their journeys and the encounters that have made them both easier and more difficult. Hearing these stories was an opportunity to self-reflect and think creatively about: The relationships needed across the system to address the complex multiple challenges that residents face • The opportunities to build better relationships and how this could make a difference for individuals and families • The barriers to working more collaboratively and how we can overcome them key points: focus of this meeting was on poverty had young people in the meeting tell their stories about growing up in Hackney, was quite a powerful way to introduce the idea that poverty is a very wide ranging issue and encompasses
