| Getting There<br>(2.0)  | <p><b>GTOS1—I know what certain words mean</b> (for example, <i>begin, describe, explain, fact, inform, introduce, introduction, opinion, text, topic, true</i>) and can do things such as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Say that an introduction is how writers begin their writing.</li> <li>Say that an introductory sentence explains what a piece of writing will be about.</li> <li>List possible topics to write about in a text.</li> <li>Identify what a piece of writing is about.</li> <li>Decide which introductory sentence best fits an example paragraph.</li> <li>Write introductory sentences using sentence starters (for example, use the sentence starter <i>Let me tell you about _____</i> to introduce a main topic).</li> </ul> <p><b>GTOS2—I know what certain words mean</b> (for example, <i>annotate, fact, prove, relevant, statement, true, topic</i>) and can do things such as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Say that facts are statements about a topic that can be proven true.</li> <li>Identify what a piece of writing is about.</li> <li>List details and information related to a topic.</li> <li>Point out facts in a text that are related to a topic.</li> <li>Decide whether a particular fact is related to a topic.</li> <li>Use a graphic organizer to organize facts about a topic.</li> </ul> <p><b>GTOS3—I know what certain words mean</b> (for example, <i>closing, conclusion, end, explain, fact, reason, summarize, topic</i>) and can do things such as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Say that a conclusion is how writers end their writing.</li> <li>Identify what a piece of writing is about.</li> <li>Write closing sentences using sentence starters (for example, use the sentence starter <i>As you can see _____</i> to explain the main topic or opinion of a paragraph).</li> <li>Decide which closing sentence best fits an example paragraph.</li> </ul> |
