I was more interested in this organization after learning about how important shade is in regards to keeping environment temperatures cooler and the disparity in urban communities.



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I learned that Tree San Diego is working on planting DAC trees that use a low or moderate amount of water in financially disadvantaged communities. DAC captures carbon dioxide from the air and prevents it from releasing more heat into the atmosphere. Another project idea was that we could research the types of trees surrounding HTH and put QR codes on them with information about the trees and what they do, which I thought was really cool.
