Dear President Gee, Provost Reed, Vice Provost Gavin, members of the WVU Board of Governors, Deans, Department Chairs, and all other members of the University Leadership:

In the wake of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and its resulting rapid and continual transitions by individuals and institutions, we write to you as graduate workers within the University, requiring a commitment from WVU towards protecting us during this time as graduate workers at <u>UNC Chapel Hill</u>, <u>Cornell</u>, <u>Yale</u>, <u>Brown</u>, <u>Princeton</u>, <u>Harvard</u>, and <u>Northwestern</u>, among others, have done. We at the WVU GPSS understand that the current pandemic is causing drastic changes to university procedures and WVU has been steadily working to navigate them; however, the University needs to minimize damage to their graduate workers and be accountable to them during this time. In her address to graduate workers during the virtual Graduate Student Appreciation Week, Provost Reed stated (italics added for emphasis):

"I hope you know just how much we value your passion, hard work and dedication toward your coursework, research and creative scholarship. During the most "normal" of times, many of you must carefully balance tight financial budgets with rigorous course loads, graduation timelines, family obligations and full-time jobs. As we continue to navigate these unprecedented circumstances, that load may feel even more burdensome than usual. Please know that you are not alone. You have the full support of the Provost's Office, the Office of Graduate Education and Life, your faculty and fellow colleagues. The talent, diversity and services you bring to the WVU community is limitless. Thank you for your continued commitment to innovative research and your contributions to the classroom, WVU and the larger community."

We agree that graduate workers are dedicated, hardworking, financially precarious, and currently burdened from the COVID-19 pandemic. We appreciate the declaration of our having "the full support of the Provost's Office, the Office of Graduate Education and Life" and faculty and colleagues, and this support needs to manifest in a clearly defined written plan which is communicated to graduate workers.

As graduate workers who are not only trying to complete our degrees, but are also teaching and conducting research for ourselves and others during this time, the lack of institutional response specifically for graduate workers has concerned many of us. As Provost Reed has rightly pointed out, we face "tight financial budgets;" "family obligations" such as taking care of our children, spouses, and loved ones (even more so during a pandemic); balancing personal research with teaching or research assistantships, grant work, and our own graduate courses. These issues, combined with our precarity as

workers, necessitates a plan from University administration - not something that should be left up to individual Colleges or Departments.

To address these concerns about the University has neither addressed nor communicated with us, to the date of this correspondence, we are calling for the University to:

- 1. Automatically extend ALL graduate workers' time-to-degree by one full calendar year, with options for additional time past the one year.
- 2. Provide concrete protections for our international graduate community.
- 3. Provide healthcare coverage pertaining to COVID-19 care for all graduate workers.
- 4. Announce a firm plan for Summer 2020, and waiving Summer 2020 University fees.
- 5. Explicitly state workplace protections for graduate workers.

In stating our demands to the University, we stand in solidarity with WVU's hourly and administrative staff, student workers, adjuncts, contingent faculty, and postdocs who also face issues including (but not limited to) job loss and loss of income, significant loss of professional opportunities, and the potential furlough of staff announced 4/23/20. This letter will be publicly available so that we can update our graduate community, as the University addresses each issue. The GPSS is ready and willing to work with the University to help solve and address these issues.

WE CALL FOR WEST VIRGINIA UNIVERSITY TO IMMEDIATELY:

#1: Automatically extend ALL graduate workers' time-to-degree by one full calendar year, with options for additional time past the one year

Currently, the University will not automatically extend all graduate workers' time-to-degree, instead asking for workers to create a memorandum signed by them and their advisor asking for an extension. This is an arbitrary and unnecessary burden in light of non-tenured faculty being granted extensions on their tenure clocks with no paperwork required. UC Santa Barbara has shown us the way in this matter, with their Graduate Council voting to automatically extend time-to-candidacy and time-to-degree by one year for all current graduate students.

The COVID-19 pandemic has affected graduate workers at all levels across all Colleges in their ability to meet graduate degree deadlines. For some, long-term progress has been halted and important test samples and other data may have been lost or are not currently accessible. These workers need assurance from the University that they will not be penalized for this disruption, and protect our ability to pursue our scholarly activities.

#2: Provide concrete protections for the international graduate worker community

WVU's international graduate workers are an important part of the Mountaineer community. They have been strongly affected by these events and some find themselves unable to leave or return to the United States or their countries of origin. International graduate workers need the Office of Global Affairs (OGA) more than ever and any reductions in personnel or resources to the OGA will heavily harm international graduate workers, by increasing processing times. The following will support our colleagues during these trying times:

- 1. **Help graduate workers maintain legal status:** WVU must aid in the extension of I-20 forms along with F-1 and J-1 visas to international graduate workers that will not be able to finish their programs in time due to the major academic disruptions caused by COVID-19. The extension of visas will allow international students unable to travel to stay in the US legally.
- 2. **Financial assistance and provision of health insurance to international graduate students who lost their assistantships**: International graduate workers' income is *solely dependent* on Graduate Assistantships, as they are not allowed to work legally outside of WVU. The loss of assistantships for international students during Summer 2020 will create an unproportionate financial hardship as well as the loss of AETNA health care coverage. WVU needs to maintain assistantships for international graduate workers during the Summer 2020 session.
- 3. Contingency plan for graduating international workers that cannot return home: Many international graduate workers that will graduate in May 2020 will not be able to return home due to the current travel restrictions. At the same time, they are not allowed to work in the US. WVU must find innovative ways to assist them during the summer months. For instance, maintaining their health care coverage, giving rent assistance and providing housing along with having a program set up specifically for international graduate workers with The RACK.
- 4. **Finding a Way to Assist Workers Unable to Return:** The possibility of travel restrictions instituted by the federal government is outside the control of the university and GPSS recognizes this. However, international graduate workers who currently cannot return to WVU need the option of an extension that allows them to return with their funding intact when this crisis ends.

#3: Provide healthcare coverage pertaining to COVID-19 care for all graduate workers

Due to unforeseen circumstances related to the pandemic - such as a graduate worker, spouse, or parent losing non-WVU health insurance through a job loss or furlough - some graduate workers may be without health coverage. Until the crisis ends, we require COVID-19 testing *and* treatment for all WVU students, faculty, and staff to help prevent the spread of this disease. The extension of these protections until the end of the crisis will help the University as a whole to curb COVID-19's spread. We recognize that AETNA, which covers many WVU graduate workers, has <u>stated that it will extend its coverage</u> for COVID-19 related cases - but as outlined this may not be available to all graduate workers.

#4: Announce a firm plan for Summer 2020, and waive Summer 2020 University fees

The possibility that the pandemic will continue deep into 2020 and beyond has many on edge, and we know that a full University reopening depends on public health projections and orders from Governor Justice. However, we require the University to:

- 1. **Fund all graduate workers who find themselves without summer funding:** As we all know, summer funding for graduate workers is tenuous at the best of times. Many of us find ourselves either without summer funding or waiting to hear from our faculty members because 'normal' summer work has been suspended due to the pandemic. We request that the University distribute funding to graduate students who are now without summer work, and thus without a way to provide for themselves and any dependents they may have.
 - a. This funding can be obtained by reallocating funds from travel expenses which President Gee noted "have reduced considerably." In his letter, President Gee states that "We have heeded the request to limit spending to only those needs that are essential and critical to the operation of the University." We argue that graduate workers are an essential and critical part of University operations.
- 2. **Immediately waive all fees for the Summer 2020 session:** Summer session bills for those signed up for classes are due May 1st. We are calling for WVU to waive summer University fees for anyone signed up for credits (including research credits/independent studies/etc.). While we are aware that the University fees are an income stream for WVU, both graduate and undergraduate students are not currently able to access resources that these fees normally pay for.
- 3. **Explicitly communicate with graduate workers:** As of April 23, 2020 the University has not communicated directly to graduate workers about any of these issues. While we appreciate the situation is changing rapidly, there has been *no reporting or disclosure directly to graduate workers from the administration* about how the pandemic affects our positions. We are calling for the University to communicate directly to graduate workers about these changes, rather than us hearing a patchwork of information from faculty and staff. This must include information about the potential furloughs to happen, as stated in the Campus Conversation on April 23, 2020.
 - a. Further, we are insisting on information about the wording of "graduate student assistants" not being considered for temporary furlough: Despite the assurance that "graduate student assistants" are not being considered for temporary furlough, we are concerned about graduate workers who do *not* have assistantships such as those with University Fellowships, outside funding, or are self funded.
 - b. Additionally we request communication to include information on the Fair Labor Standards Act which covers full- and part-time workers in the private sector and in federal, state, and local governments (which includes WVU as a state entity); which states that workers who are not being paid are not required to work i.e. if a graduate worker is not being paid, their advisor/supervisor *cannot* ask or require them to work
- 4. **Provisions for professional graduate workers who need to do specific activities for their degree requirements:** We are asking the WVU administration to lobby state lawmakers to lower

hour requirements for professional graduate workers; such as physical and occupational therapists, dieticians, immunology, and athletic training, etc. in order for them to be able to obtain these licenses during the pandemic.

a. This is also related to protecting our international graduate worker community, as those specific graduate workers may experience additional hardships due to current social distancing and travel restrictions.

#5: Explicitly state workplace protections for graduate workers

All graduate workers who are working in any setting where they come into contact with the public - especially those working in healthcare - MUST be provided with adequate Personal Protective Equipment *before* they start said work.

Graduate workers should never be put in a position where they have to choose between their health and meeting work obligations. No graduate worker should be pressured to work by their supervisor or departments in any way that may endanger their health and safety or that of others. The University administration must enact a clear WVU-wide non-retaliation policy that prohibits retaliation on the part of advisors, supervisors, and department administrators against graduate workers who refused to work to protect their health and the health of the community. University administration must provide a fair and transparent mechanism to address retaliation concerns, should they arise. In addition to this, we require that the University sends out a university-wide email with this policy explicitly stated.
