## **Course Description**

This course is designed to develop students' skills in understanding and analyzing the craft of creative writing while fostering their own unique voice. Students will engage with a range of literary genres, such as poetry, short stories, memoirs, and plays, and learn to write for varied purposes and audiences. Emphasis is placed on narrative techniques, figurative language, theme development, and collaborative revision processes.

## **Goals & Standards**

The goal of this course is to empower students to become confident, creative writers and critical readers. Through the study of varied literary genres and forms, including narratives, poetry, and nonfiction, students will develop their personal voice while mastering essential writing skills such as organization, use of figurative language, and point of view.

Students will learn to analyze complex texts, identify thematic elements, and engage in collaborative writing and revision processes. The course also emphasizes effective communication skills, including oral presentations supported by evidence, and the integration of digital tools to enhance written and multimedia projects.

By the end of the course, students will be equipped to express themselves thoughtfully and creatively across a range of literary and digital platforms, preparing them for future academic and personal success.

### **Communication Protocols**

Students can communicate with me by...

- ...writing a note, sending a message, asking a question, or simply saying, "Hey, I've got something on my mind." However you reach out, I'm listening.
- ...email, Canvas, carrier pigeon, or an in-class "can we talk?" If it matters to you, it matters to me.
- ...words, whispers, written wonders, or well-timed eye contact. If you've got something to say, I want to hear it.
- ...typing, talking, or tapping on the desk three times (okay, maybe just the first two). If you need me, let me know.

# **Electronic Device Policy**

## Grading

- Students should have multiple opportunities to practice, receive feedback, and demonstrate their knowledge and skills
- It is critical for students to develop productive habits of work alongside content and skill development

# **Academic Dishonesty**
