The **Peer-Produced Research Reading Club** is a weekly online meet-up that takes place every Wednesday at 5pm UTC (9am PST, 6pm CET). **What:** Topics related to understanding and advancing collaborative research and peer production processes in citizen & community science.

**Who**: academic researchers, citizen scientists, self-researchers, students, and anyone interested in collaborative research.

Readings of interest may thus span diverse fields, including:

- qualitative and quantitative studies about the motivations, learning processes and barriers of personal science practitioners and citizen scientists
- user-centric design approaches and studies to improve digital citizen science processes, tools and platforms;
- case studies on co-created citizen / community science projects.
- data governance and open science in collaborative science settings.

### Scope includes:

- recent research publications
- foundational literature / historic papers
- non-traditional sources (e.g. essays, blog posts, etc.)

#### Format:

- Reading introduction: Introduce the item chosen for discussion this week, and why it
  was chosen. (Note: scheduled items should have a 1-2 sentence explanation on the
  schedule about "why" they have been selected as "of interest")
- Rose/Thorn/Bud go-around: What is something positive/we liked? What is something negative/we did not like? What's something that has potential, sparks an idea?
- **Next week's reading** is briefly introduced by the person that selected it.
